

Name Col. Morris, Col. Moore To Stout Field Staff Posts

Two new assistant chiefs of staff at headquarters of the I troop carrier command at Stout field have been appointed by Brig. Gen. William D. Old, commanding general.

They are Lt. Col. Robert Morris, A-4, succeeding Lt. Col. S. G. Harvey, and Lt. Col. Samuel T. Moore, A-2, succeeding Lt. Col. Robert P. Bliss.

Col. Morris will supervise the supply section of the ITCO. He is a West Point graduate and recently returned to this country after 23 months in Panama.

A veteran of world war I, Col. Moore will supervise the intelligence section of the ITCO. He formerly served as chief of the Far East section of the air branch, G-2, in Washington, before going to the China-Burma-India theater in

A "Moccasin Massacre" dance and "I" men's smoker also will follow on tonight's schedule of activities. Master of ceremonies at the pow-wow will be John S. Hastings, Washington, alumni trustee. Speakers will include LeRoy Sanders, Indianapolis, president of the "I" men's association; Glen Hillis, Kokomo; A. N. (Bo) McMillin, football coach, and Z. G. Clevenger, athletic director.

ARMY STILL NEEDS HOTELS--STIMSON

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (U. P.).—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said yesterday the decision to utilize army camps as redistribution centers for the growing volume of

soldiers sent back from overseas did not mean that hotel facilities would be abandoned.

Stimson said present hotels available to the army would be inadequate and "only those men certified by physicians as requiring those facilities would be sent to hotels." Others returning from overseas will go to special redistribution camps.

Stamp to Mark Film's 50th Year

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (U. P.).—A new three-cent stamp commemorating the 50th anniversary of motion pictures will be issued at the end of the month, according to Postmaster Gen. Frank C. Walker.

The stamp, depicting a motion picture being shown to a G. I. audience in the South Pacific, will have its "premier" Oct. 31 in Hollywood and New York City. Collectors wanting first-day covers may send up to 10 self-addressed envelopes to the postmasters at Los Angeles, 82, Cal., or New York, 1, N. Y. Walker said.
