### Plant to Remain

THE NAVAL ORDNANCE plant out at 21st and Arlington, now operated for the navy by the Lukas-Harold Corp., has been made a permanent part of the navy's shore establishment and will be continued here after the war. . . . This good news was announced by the commanding officer at the plant, Warren Gladling, who has just been raised from the rank of commander to captain. . . . At present the plant is reported turning out the Norden bombsight and various fire control devices. . . . An estimated 900 employees of the Allison division were made idle temporarily when the government cancelled a P-75 fighter plane contract, thus halting production of the 24-cylinder Allison engine. . . . Officials said the idle workmen probably could be absorbed in the production of the 12-cylinder Allison. . . . The Stewart-Warner Corp. announced that its experimental laboratories, sales and engineering departments will be removed from Chicago to Indianapolis as soon as the company can arrange housing facilities for 120 of the personnel. . . . Company officials said they expect to start manufacturing auto heaters for civilian use within a few months. . . . The firm now is doing war work exclusively.
