Election day will determine woman's political acuteness. Mrs. Frederick G. Balz said at a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Robert's Parliamentary law club in Ayres' auditorium.

"This is our opportunity to safeguard and underwrite our American principles so strongly through our ballots that these principles cannot be challenged again in our generation," she said. Mrs. Balz is a candidate for re-election to the Indiana general assembly.

The candidate stated that a large responsibility has been placed upon the shoulders of the women in the coming election since 65 per cent of all the qualified voters this year are women.

"Of the three branches of government there is none more important than the legislative," Mrs. Balz pointed out.

"Women are peculiarly fitted to serve their state and nation in this branch, but there is no place on the floor of either chamber for any woman who thinks that charm rather than preparation will see her through," she added.
