**BALFOUR DAY
TO BE MARKED**City-Wide Meeting Tonight
At Kirshbaum
Center.

Speaker at the annual observance of Balfour day tonight in the Kirshbaum community center auditorium will be Rabbi Joachim Prinz, a former Berlin resident, who will talk on "From Berlin to Washington."

The affair will be a city-wide meeting opening at 8:30 p.m. under auspices of the Indianapolis Zionists. It will mark the declaration by British Foreign Secretary Lord Balfour favoring establishment in Palestine of a national home of Jews.

A musical program will be presented, featuring Cantor Myro Glass and Mrs. Evelyn Borofsky Roskin.

The Balfour declaration will be recited by Meyer Gallin, past president of the Indianapolis district. There also will be group singing.

Arrangements were made by a committee composed of Leo Selig, chairman; Rabbi Israel Chodofsky; Rabbi Samuel J. Fox; Rabbi David S. Shapiro; Ben Paller; Mr. Gallin; and Allan Bloom. Alex Katz is assistant chairman.

Dr. Prinz is a native of Germany and is an outstanding spokesman of German Jewry. He has written a number of religious books, as well as a political book and several children's volumes.

**GRANT INJUNCTION
AGAINST FILM FUND**

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 2 (U.P.)—The screen office employees guild was under injunction to halt assessments for political use.

"A political belief is one's own," Superior Judge Emmet H. Wilson said in granting the injunction, "and any assessment levied for political action is unlawful and illegal."

Four union members brought the suit on grounds that members who refused to pay were barred from studios and funds were used for the candidacy of Hal Styles, admitted ex-Klux-Klan Klan member, seeking a congressional seat.

MEAT—Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through P5 are good.

CANNED GOODS—Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through W5 in Book 4 good, indefinitely for 10 points each.

SUGAR—Stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 in Book 4 are good indefinitely for 5 pounds. Stamp 40 in Book 4 good for 5 pounds of canning sugar.

Applicants applying for canning sugar should send in one space stamp 37, attached to the application for each applicant.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Nov. 2.—The Democratic party always has been the liberal party, opposed to a Republican leadership which always has been conservative and reactionary. Governor Schricker, Democratic senatorial nominee, declared here last night.

Jackson Foresees

ANDERSON, Ind., Nov. 2.—Senator Samuel D. Jackson, the Democratic gubernatorial nominee, predicted a Democratic victory in a speech here last night "because the peculiar circumstances of the case have made strong appeal to men and women in both parties."

"Under the leadership of the administration for 12 years now by a program of economic relief and social reform, both long and broad, we have demonstrated that we have the knowledge, vision and courage to go the limit in reconstruction and reconstruction in Indiana," he said.
