

Hoosier Heroes: Street Dead; McIntyre, McComb, Osborn, Fessler, Thomas Injured

An Indianapolis sailor has died in Florida after his rescue from waters off Key West, and five others have been wounded. Meanwhile an infantryman, previously reported missing in France, now is safe.

Gunner's Mate 3-c Ralph Lawrence Street, son of Mrs. Caroline M. Church, 3704 E. New York st., died Oct. 28 in a hospital shortly after he was rescued from waters off Key West, Fla.

The navy department disclosed no other details of his death. He was a member of the crew of a sub chaser and was 19.

Gunner Street entered the navy in August, 1942. He attended school in Lewisville and Sulphur Springs, W. Va., was a member of the Lewisville Methodist church.

His body will arrive at his mother's residence tomorrow morning. Friends may call there until Saturday noon. Services will be held at 2 p. m. Sunday in the Stanley mortuary in New Castle. Burial will be in Forest.

Pfc. Robert Lee Osborn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Haskell B. Osborn, 3033 N. Delaware st., was slightly wounded in Germany Oct. 14.

Pvt. Osborn received the purple heart for wounds previously received in France Sept. 10. The 20-year-old infantryman entered the service in February and went overseas in August. He received his training at Camp Blanding, Fla.

A graduate of the Robinson, Ill., high school, he attended McKendree college one year.

Pfc. Robert Neil McIntyre, son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil McIntyre, 3619 N. Grant st., was wounded in France Sept. 19.

The 22-year-old infantryman entered the service in November, 1940, and has served overseas three years. He attended Technical high school. A brother, Pvt. Norman, is in an engineer corps in the South Pacific.

Marine Pfc. Everett E. Fessler, son of Mrs. Esther Springer, Oaklandon, was wounded on Palau in his fifth major invasion in the Southwest Pacific.

Pvt. Fessler entered the marine corps Dec. 17, 1941, and has been overseas 28 months. Now in a hospital in New Caledonia, he is 21.

Pfc. John E. Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Thomas, 738 N. Graham ave., received a broken leg Oct. 12 in France, when he was struck by a sniper's bullet.

Pvt. Thomas has been in the infantry since July, 1943 and overseas since September. A graduate of Technical high school, he was a Rector scholar at DePauw university for three years.

He has a brother, C. Gordon Thomas, in training as a navigator at the Greenville, Miss., army air base.

Marine Cpl. Lawrence E. Barnes, son of Mrs. Pauline Patterson, R. R. 1, Box 110, has been wounded on Peleliu island.

Pvt. James W. Plummer, husband of Mrs. Mildred Plummer, 532 Livingston ave., and son of Mrs. James McQueen, 2516 Southeastern ave., who was reported missing in France Oct. 2 now is safe and has returned to active duty.

The 23-year-old infantryman formerly was employed by the Hoosier Paper Co.

The second cluster was for a withdrawal cover mission in support of a heavy bomber attack on the Romano American oil refineries at Ploesti, Romania, where the fighter pilots engaged and drove away 80 enemy planes at a loss of only one P-38. Ten enemy planes were shot down.

Quads in Good Health and 'Doing Fine'

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2 (U. P.).—Three girls and a boy, the first-born six minutes older than the "baby," and all of them starting their second day of life, were in "perfect health" and "good color" in hospital incubators today, unaware that their Caesarian birth called for a new page in obstetrical history.

The problem of naming the babies remained. They were tagged A, B, C, and D, by the hospital staff.

THREE special nurses watched over the quadruplets born to Mrs. Joseph Cirminello, 30, and her husband, a Securities and Exchange analyst. The father called repeatedly at Philadelphia Lying In hospital to see his attractive, 30-year-old wife and said he was regaining the 12 pounds he "worried" away waiting for the multiple birth.

The Cirminello foursome was perhaps the best kept secret ever born. The father knew about their prospective arrival, so did friends, and doctors told newspaper reporters.

BUT THE mother didn't know that more than one was expected until an attending physician let the information slip within earshot as she lay on an operating table.

Their existence was revealed three months ago by X-ray, and there were three active and 10 passive, but prominent obstetricians present when A, B, C and D arrived just before lunch yesterday.

Dr. John C. Ullery, 37, brought the babies in what was believed to be the first Caesarian delivery of quadruplets on record.
