Pennsylvania Electoral Vote To Decide Race, Writers Say

The 1944 presidential campaign today entered the "final prediction" stage.

Democratic National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan predicted on the basis of last minute reports from party workers that Governor Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican presidential nominee, would not win even the 81 electoral votes that Wendell L. Willkie polled in 1940.

Republican National Chairman Herbert Brownell Jr., withheld his final overall prediction but forecast Dewey would take Massachusetts.

Newsweek magazine, announcing the final results of its election survey by 118 political writers, said the two candidates were running so close that Pennsylvania's 35 electoral votes would decide the election. It called Pennsylvania a "toss-up."

Other developments:

Norman Thomas, Socialist party candidate for President, said that President Roosevelt and Dewey were waging a "pot versus kettle" campaign and declared that neither party had proposed a cradle to grave social security plan.




