CHILDREN'S BOOK WEEK ARRANGED

Elizabeth Ball's Collection
To Be Feature of
Library Program.

Children's Book week, formerly a nation-wide celebration which this year has grown to world-wide proportions, will be observed in Indianapolis Nov. 12 to 18.

The 1944 theme, "United Through Books," will be carried out in celebrations in this country and in England, Brazil, Russia, Mexico, India and other countries.

The local celebration will be a book fair, an exhibit of early children's books from the world famous collection of Miss Elizabeth Ball, Muncie, under the direction of Miss Evelyn Ray Sickels, supervisor of children's work in the public library. The exhibit will be in the Indianapolis public library, Medieval and St. Clair sts.

Emphasize Juvenile Books

Special emphasis will be placed on the importance of juvenile books since this year marks the 200th anniversary of the publication of the first children's book, "Little Pretty Pocketbook," published by John Newbery in London. Several Newbery originals will be included in the 400 items selected from Miss Ball's collection for the exhibit.

Miss Ball will speak at 2:30 p.m. and at 4 p.m., Monday, in Crosepy auditorium. Several Hoosier authors also will speak in conjunction with the book fair.

Jeanette Covert Nolan, Indianapolis Star columnist and author of 10 teen-age books, and Laura Long, Columbus author, will speak at 2:30 and at 4 p.m., Tuesday, at the auditorium.

Play Will Be Given

Featured on Wednesday's program at the library will be Mabel Leigh Hunt, author of 14 books, and Miriam E. Mason, Bloomington, author of 11 books for children, at 2:30 and 4 p.m. Katherine Gibson Wicks will speak at corresponding times Thursday.

"John Newbery's Bookshop," a play for children, will be presented in the auditorium at 3:45 p.m. Friday, climaxing the week's celebration.

Several other speakers will address children at branch libraries during the week. Miss Augusta Stevenson, author of "George Washington Carver," and Clotilde Embree Fink, artist and illustrator of Miss Stevenson's book, will speak at 8 a.m., Nov. 14, at West Indianapolis branch, and at 3:30 p.m., Nov. 15, at the Prospect branch.

LEGION PARLEY OPENS NOV. 14

National Leaders to Meet
On Membership, Plans
For Next Year.

American Legion leaders throughout the country will meet here Nov. 14-20 to outline details of the 1945 program.

Highlight of the conference will be the 16th annual national telegraphic membership roll call. Visiting state commanders and adjutants will report their advance enrollments for 1945.

The state conference of state commanders and adjutants will be held from Nov. 14-17, while the executive committee will be in session from Nov. 18-20.

Topics on Agenda

To be discussed will be the legion's campaign for immediate enactment of universal military training legislation, raising of an Americanism endowment fund of \$15,000,000, distributing approximately 500,000 Christmas gifts to all hospitalized veterans, and expanding the services and aids of the national welfare programs.

Department commanders and adjutants will meet Nov. 14 to consider Americanism, rehabilitation, national defense, legislation, world war II liaison, membership and child welfare.

John W. Darr, head of the Institute of Public Relations, New York, will address the conference Nov. 14 on the public relations problems of the legion.

Gen. Hines to Speak

Thirty-five national commissions, boards and committees of the legion will meet Nov. 17 to prepare reports for the executive committee.

Among those who will speak during the sessions will be Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, administrator of veterans' affairs; Alvin M. Owsley, national commander; Milo J. Warner, past national commander, who will report on the enlarging of national headquarters; Maurice F. Devine, national legislative chairman, and M. T. Kelleher, national defense chairman.
