CHILDREN'S BOOK WEEK ARRANGED

Elizabeth Ball's Collection To Be Feature of Library Program

Children's Book week, formerly a nation-wide celebration which this year has grown to world-wide proportions, will be observed in Indianapolis Nov. 12 to 18.

The 1944 theme, "United Through Books," will be carried out in celebration in this country and in England, Brazil, Russia, Mexico, India and other countries.

The local celebration will be a book fair, an exhibit of early children's books from the world famous collection of Miss Elizabeth Ball, Muncie, under the direction of Miss Evelyn Ray Sicks, supervisor of children's work in the public library. The exhibit will be in the Indianapolis public library, Meridian and St. Clair sts.

Emphasize Juvenile Books

Special emphasis will be placed on the importance of juvenile books since this year marks the 200th anniversary of the publication of the first children's book, "Little Pretty Pocketbook," published by John Newbery in London. Several Newbery originals will be included in the 400 items selected from Miss Ball's collection for the exhibit.

Miss Ball will speak at 2:30 p. m. and at 4 p. m., Monday, in Cropley auditorium. Several Hoosier authors also will speak in conjunction with the book fair.

Jeanette Covert Nolan, Indianapolis Star columnist and author of 10 teen-age books, and Laura Long, Columbus author, will speak at 2:30 and at 4 p. m., Tuesday, at the auditorium.

Featured on Wednesday's program at the library will be Mabel Leigh Hunt, author of 14 books, and Miriam E. Mason, Bloomington, author of 11 books for children, at 2:30 and 4 p. m. Katherine Gibson Wicks will speak at corresponding times Thursday.

"John Newbery's Bookshop," a play for children, will be presented in the auditorium at 3:45 p. m. Friday, climaxing the week's celebration.

Topics on Agenda

To be discussed will be the legion's campaign for immediate enactment of universal military training legislation, raising of an Americanism endowment fund of \$15,000,000, distributing approximately 500,000 Christmas gifts to all hospitalized veterans, and expanding the services and aids of the national welfare programs.

Americanism, rehabilitation, national defense, legislation, world war II liaison, membership and child welfare.

A tribute to the men and women of the Irvington neighborhood who have died for their country will be paid Sunday during the annual Gold Star service of Irvington Post No. 38, American Legion.

The service will be held at 7:45 p. m. at Howe high school and will be open to the public. Co-operating with the post will be various church organizations of the East Side.

Approximately 120 Gold Star citations of men and women who have died while serving with the armed forces. In addition, each family of a man or woman who has died outside the continental United States will receive a flag. The flag tribute will commemorate about 75 deaths.
