The theme of the exhibit, "Family Fun," will be carried out in exhibits of books, toys and other material designed for home entertainment and as aids to the mental and physical development of children.


Sections of the exhibit will cover fine arts, toys, parental education, radio, health, religion, children's books, hobbies and outdoor winter fun.
