Bernard Cunniff, Munitions Maker and Spink Aid, Buried

Bernard Cunniff, manager of the Spink properties here, died Thursday in Charlestown hospital, Cambridge, Mass., and was buried Saturday in Boston.

Mr. Cunniff, who was 66, manufactured magnesium materials for the allies during the last war and was the first in this country to manufacture tracer bullets, incendiary bombs and photographic bombs.

Organizing the Colloidal Equipment Corp. of New York after World War I, he later resigned his position as president and came to Indianapolis to operate the Spink properties. He lived in the Spink-Armahotel.

At the time of his death Mr. Cunniff was president and manager of the General Apartments, Inc., which operates the Spink properties, president and general manager of the Spink-Armahotel Corp. and was active in mining properties in Alaska and South Dakota.

Mr. Cunniff was a member of the Harvard club in New York City and the Indianapolis Athletic club.

Surviving are his wife, Bonnie, two sisters, Miss Ellen L. Cunniff of Boston, and Mrs. George S. Warren of Fairfield, Conn., and Washington, and a sister-in-law, Dr. Surbana Spink of Indianapolis.

Miss McDowell, who was 77, died yesterday in Methodist hospital.
