

OPA TO CHECK ON TRAVEL GAS

Program Planned to Prevent Illegal Use of Rations This Winter.

An enforcement program to prevent illegal use of gasoline rations in winter vacation travel was being prepared today by the Indiana district OPA.

Last spring thousands of motorists—many of them from Indiana—were stranded in Florida and other southern states.


Motorists who use B and C gasoline for vacation travel will be halted before OPA hearing commissioners who are authorized to revoke not only the supplemental rations but the basic A ration, too, OPA officials said.

Since some Indiana boards are known to have issued rations last winter for "health" reasons—although this is illegal—thus permitting residents to go south, district office executives were preparing to avoid a repetition.

EVOLUTION SEEN FOR AIR FORCE

Junking of Present Planes In 3 Years Predicted By Army Expert.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (U. P.)—The air force of the future will be "quite different" from that of today with planes that will dwarf the performance of existing 300-mile-per-hour fighters and four-engined bombers, a report by a high-ranking army officer indicated today.

The official, Maj. Gen. Oliver P. Echols, assistant chief of staff in charge of materiel, told the house post-war military policy committee that "we have the greatest air force in the world today but within two to three years every piece of equipment we now have will be obsolete."

"With the research now going on in connection with jet engines, rockets, supersonics, electronics and improved explosives," Echols said, "we have no idea what the airplane of the future will be like or how the air force will be equipped or operated in combat."

"We do know that it will be quite different from what it is today, and there is every reason to believe the changes during the next 10 years will be much greater than the changes during the last 10 years."

Ten years ago the fastest air speed was about 150 miles an hour. Today, all first-class fighter planes

OIL TREATY DELAYED BY SENATE GROUP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (U. P.)—The senate foreign relations committee voted yesterday to delay until the new congress meets in January consideration of the Anglo-American oil compact and the treaty with Mexico concerning allocation of water along the Texas and California borders.

Committee Chairman Tom Connally (D. Tex.) said the action was taken in view of the senate rule that the committee shall consider anew all treaties on which action is not completed by the session during which they are submitted.

There appeared to be no chance of final action this year on either of the treaties.


