

## Reds Storming Danube Isle Near Budapest, Germans Say

LONDON, Nov. 24 (U. P.)—Red army troops were reported storming Csepel Island in the Danube on the southern edge of Budapest today.

Other Soviet forces hooked down across the southeastern corner of Slovakia in a fast-breaking offensive that threatened to roll up the shaken German flank in Hungary.

Berlin and Moscow agreed that furious fighting was raging on the immediate, eastern approaches to Budapest and at a half-dozen key points on the long battlefield extending 170 miles northeast of the capital into Slovakia.

### Russ Silent on Report

But the Russian early morning communique remained silent on a Berlin announcement that Red army troops had landed in force on Csepel, a 30-mile long island formed by two arms of the Danube extending almost into the heart of

### G. O. P. Names Willis to Key Committee on Committees

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Sen. Raymond E. Willis (R. Ind.) was notified today that he has been named to the important committee on committees of the senate Republican conference.

This group decides what committee assignments shall be given G. O. P. senators. Senator Arthur A. Vandenberg (R. Mich.) is chairman. When Senator-elect Homer E. Capehart (R. Ind.) was here earlier this week, he conferred with Senator Vandenberg regarding his committee assignments, seeking particularly to get on the state commerce committee, which he says, will handle reconversion.

He also would like an agriculture committee assignment, but Senator Willis is already on that committee. Vandenberg's Letter

In a letter to Senator Willis notifying him of his appointment, Senator Vandenberg said: "While the rules of the Republican conference require the new committee on committees to be appointed by the newly elected conference chairman following the convening of the new session, it has been deemed advisable (as the result of a meeting of the steering committee) that the new committee on committees should be tentatively designated now."
