

Hoosier Heroes: Allee and Sutton Killed Overseas; Plane Crashes in U. S. Claim Lives of Stewart and Kauffman

Pvt. Irvin (Luke) Allee, reported missing after action in Italy on Oct. 25, was killed that day, according to word received yesterday by his father, Charles E. Allee Sr., 546 N. Sheffield ave.

Pvt. Allee was wounded May 19 in Italy and had received the purple heart. He was serving with the medical corps and was one of the first foot soldiers to enter Rome.

A graduate of Washington high school, he is 19, and entered the army in July, 1943. He had been overseas since January, 1944.

Survivors, besides his father, include four sisters, Lucille, Alberta, Barbara and Sarah, at home, and a brother, Pvt. Charles E. Allee Jr., stationed in England.

S. Sgt. Floyd F. Sutton, husband of Mrs. Pauline Sutton, 618 W. New York st., was killed in action Oct. 28 on Leyte. He had been overseas four months and was decorated for bravery on Sept. 9 in the South Pacific.

The sergeant was 39 and formerly was employed by a trucking company in Chicago, where he saw his wife live before he entered the service. Oct. 17, 1942.

Survivors, besides his wife, are a daughter, Ruth, Marion; four sisters, Mrs. Marjorie Bell, Peru; Mrs. Estella Hembly, Logansport; Mrs. Pauline Bleigher, Walton, and Mrs. Helen Miller, Hartford City; two brothers, Charlie and Homer, Chicago; two step-sisters, Betty and Virginia Sutton, Logansport, and one step-brother, Pvt. Robert Sutton, who is serving overseas.

Second Lt. John W. Stewart, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Stewart, Carmel, was killed Saturday when his P-38 fighter plane crashed into a garage at Ontario, Cal., air field authorities have announced.

Lt. Stewart was 20 and entered the air forces in February, 1943. He was home on a leave in October, reporting back to California Nov. 8. Mr. and Mrs. George Fox, Indian-




