

POPE WILL SEND RITTER PALLIUM

Archbishop to Be Entitled to Wear Decoration After Installation.

A simple decoration woven of lamb's wool, called the pallium, indicates the important rank of archbishop in the Roman Catholic church.

The Most Rev. Joseph Ritter, archbishop-elect, will be entitled to wear the pallium around his shoulders after he is installed as archbishop of the archdiocese of Indianapolis Tuesday.

The pallium will be sent by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII, from Rome according to the procedure of the church.

Palliums Blessed

It is a coincidence that the newly made palliums are solemnly blessed after the second vespers on the feasts of SS. Peter and Paul. The latter are the titular saints of the Catholic cathedral here where the installation of the new archbishop and the establishment of the ecclesiastical Province will be conducted.

It was in this church, also, that the archbishop-elect served as assistant pastor and was consecrated bishop.

The pallium is a circular band of snow white wool, about two inches wide, worn about the neck, chest and shoulders. It has two pendants, one hanging in the front and one behind. The pendants are two inches wide and 12 inches long. Six small black crosses adorn the pallium—one on the chest and back, one on each pendant and one on each shoulder.

The Pallium's Wool

The wool from which the pallium is woven is partially supplied by two lambs presented annually to the pope as a tax by priests who reside at St. John's Lateran in Rome.

The Very Rev. Msgr. Henry F. Dugan, chancellor, says the pallium has not arrived in Indianapolis and is not expected until the first of the year. If it had come in time, it would have been conferred upon the new archbishop after the oath of allegiance.

Urge Penicillin In Toothpastes

LONDON, Dec. 14 (U. P.)—Penicillin may appear soon in toothpastes to combat bacteria in the mouth and throat, Sir Alexander Fleming, discoverer of the drug, said yesterday at the Royal Institute of Public Health and Hygiene.

The penicillin formula is "sure to be used by a multitude of people for minor infections of the throat, nose and mouth," Sir Alexander said. "They are nearly all caused by penicillin-sensitive microbes. The task is to get penicillin to the microbes."

CONGREGATION ACCEPTS PLANS

Construction to Start on North Side When War Restrictions End.

The congregation of the Forest Manor Methodist church has outgrown its quarters in a converted residence and accepted plans for a new building.

The new edifice will be erected on the corner of Forest Manor ave. and E. 34th st. as rapidly as war restrictions permit, the pastor, the Rev. Charles T. Jones, announces.

The temporary church now stands on the site of the proposed building. The Forest Manor congregation was organized in the late twenties by the Methodist City Council and Church Extension society.

Its growth has been continuous, the membership now numbering about 130 and the Sunday school attendance, 125.

The Rev. Mr. Jones set plans in motion for the new church as soon as he was appointed pastor in June, 1943. He has the endorsement of the council and society in promotion of the new building.

Buy Extra Bond, Stilwell Urges

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (U. P.)—Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, former commander of U. S. forces in the China-Burma-India theater, today urged "each and every" American to buy at least one extra \$100 bond in the Sixth War Loan drive.

Stilwell, recently recalled from China because of differences with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, said in a statement that "just so long as an American faces a Japanese gun, we must keep on buying bonds."

U. S. VISE TIGHTENS UPON 20,000 JAPS


ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Philippines, Dec. 14 (U. P.)—The 77th division struck north up the Ormoc corridor today.

A giant American nutcracker gradually was squeezing 20,000 or more Japanese back against the northwest coast of Leyte.

At the northern end of the corridor, weary veterans of the 32d division slogged farther south to within less than 15 miles of a junction with the 77th. Other forces slowly closed in on the bitterly-resisting Japanese from hills to the east.

The application of "pressure northward" by the 77th division was disclosed by Gen. Douglas MacArthur in his daily communiqué. A spokesman said, however, that the troops mainly were feeling out enemy lines. An all-out assault had not yet been started.


American shore batteries sank three troop-laden Japanese ships with all hands at point-blank range Tuesday night.
