

SIGNAL GIVEN FOR BOND DASH

\$5,000,000 Spurt Needed To Put County Over Quota Line.

With the close of the sixth war loan drive only a day away, bond solicitors in Marion county today were making a last minute effort to put the county over the top.

Still short \$5,000,000 of reaching the county's quota of \$87,250,000, the county war finance committee urged residents who have not been contacted by solicitors to phone the committee so arrangements can be made for them to purchase bonds.

Of the deficiency, William H. Trimble, county war finance committee chairman, predicted that today's sales would reach \$3,000,000, leaving \$2,000,000 to be realized tomorrow.

John K. Jennings, state director of the war manpower commission, meanwhile challenged WMO staffs in the other states to match or pass the Indiana office's record purchase in this bond drive.

Auditor Steals From Detectives

DR. FISHBEIN STABS AT SOCIAL MEDICINE

Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the American Medical Association Journal, said last night that socialized medicine "definitely is not the answer" to the problem of making medical science available to all persons.

Dr. Fishbein told the Temple Brotherhood of the Indianapolis Hebrew congregation that the socialization of medicine would impede medical science and add to the tax burden.

"We must plan to give everybody the most that medical science can give, but socialized medicine is definitely not the answer," he said.

Group industrial insurance programs protect more than 18,000,000 workers in 18,000 industries against sickness and hospitalization costs. Dr. Fishbein said, adding that more than 17,000,000 other persons voluntarily insured themselves against illness and accidents under the "blue cross" plan.

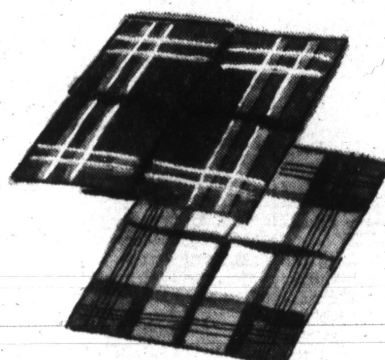
