## Germans Reported Fleeing Entire Ardennes Position

(Continued From Page One)

German are beginning to move out of the Ardennes bulge slowly by fighting a delaying action, and that they may take up positions along a ridge south of Houffalize as soon as they have cleared their armored units from the bulge," a dispatch from Lt. Gen. Courtney Hodges' 1st army headquarters said.

Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley, commander of the 12th army group, warned, however, that the Germans are not on the verge of collapse.

Their losses in the Ardennes offensive have been so heavy, however, they are likely to affect the course of the war in the west, he said.

While Hodges' arm of Baltz, the German tanks three miles north of La Roche, other 1st army forces were closing on the key town, anchoring a broad section of the German defense.

United Press Correspondents C. R. Cunningham and Boyd Lewis reported from the front that the American breakthrough in the north had seriously imperiled the entire German position inside the salient.

Two columns of the 2d armored division moved into position for the tank battle last night.

Clearing weather earlier today got the struggle off to a brisk start. A blinding snowstorm followed, robbing the Americans of air support.

At midafternoon the skies showed some sign of clearing again.

At captured Provedoux, where Hodges' forces were only four miles from the Houffalize-St. Vith highway, the doughboys stood fast without even undertaking an advance in the vise weather.

A column of the British 2d army striking southeast into the crumpling nose of the salient captured Cheoux, four miles south of Hottot.

**Defenses Break Up**

From end to end of the 25-mile northern flank the German defenses were breaking up.

With two to three feet of snow clogging most of the roads through the Ardennes, the allied tank columns were making very slow progress.

At many points half-frozen riflemen were moving out ahead of their armored screen to engage the enemy in a bid to cut his lifeline in the western and southwestern end of the salient.

The overall situation was described officially as more favorable than at any time since Marshal Karl von Rundstedt embarked on his great gamble in the Ardennes Dec. 16.

Hope was running high that a substantial part of the 2d German divisions in the bulge could be

destroyed.

The FEATHERSTONES received a letter from France about two weeks ago and one from Belgium last week. Both, however, held little significance as they were undated. The latest letter, received yesterday, was written on Dec. 24.

"We are o. k.," they wrote, "and will tell you all about it when we can." They added that things weren't bad but they were kept moving from place to place.

**THE LETTER** received by Sgt. Lynch's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ivan E. Lynch, 1520 E. Ohio st., was dated Dec. 23.

The sergeant did not mention whether he had been wounded or was ill but said that this was his first chance he'd had to write in about three weeks.

His latest previous letter home was written about the second week in November.

SGT. LYNCH entered the army about two years ago and began his training at the Alabama Polytechnic Institute under the army specialized training program.

When the ASTP was discontinued the sergeant was transferred to the infantry and was assigned to the 106th.

The 106th left Atterbury in October and was shipped to England. Sgt. Lynch's parents received a letter written on Nov. 4 in which he said he had arrived in England. He was serving with the 424th regiment.

In the senate, newly-inaugurated Lt. Gov. Richard T. James took the gavel for the first time at a short session late yesterday.

He urged legislators to co-operate with Governor Gates "in all of his undertakings for the good of the people."

Legislators flocked into both houses today with their pockets full of new bills. Many of them covered policies adopted recently by the American legislative steering committee.

Before adjournment yesterday both houses adopted resolutions extending "heartfelt good wishes" to Henry F. Schricker as he retires from the office of governor which he has graced with dignity, integrity and ability during the last four years.

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
