Dr. R. E. Vale Will Read Vows Uniting

She will have a tulle Juliet cap embroidered with seed pearls from which a three-tiered, full length, English illusion veil will fall. She will carry an all-white bouquet centered with orchids, sprays of phalaenopsis, lilacs and freesia tied with candlelight satin streamers.

The attendants will be gowned alike in faille frocks made with round necklines, cap sleeves, straight fronts and bustle backs worn with long matching gloves.
