

BLACK MARKET KILLING HINTED

Body of Cheesemaker Is Found in Sewer.

CHICAGO, April 7 (U. P.)—The body of a man, found crammed in a city sewer, was identified today as that of Onofrio Vitale, 50, Chinatown cheese maker last seen Feb. 25, 1944.

The identity was established by George Carberry, Gary, Ind. dentist, who identified bridge work he had made for Vitale in 1930.

The body was found by a city employee Thursday when he investigated complaints of a clogged sewer. Police said the man, tied by heavy rope, apparently was the victim of a gang ride.

Black Market Suspected

Vitale had been suspected of black market operations with James V. De Angelo, gambler, whose body was found March 11, 1944, in the trunk of his car here.

Vitale was an employee of the Grande Cheese Co., a firm in which part interest was held by Thomas Negila, shot and killed by three gunmen in December, 1943. Investigators said Negila was slain because of his activities in a cheese black market.

Soon after Vitale's disappearance, police speculated that he may have been killed by the same gang that murdered De Angelo.

Attended Meeting

Vitale left his home Feb. 25, 1944, the last time he was seen, saying he was going to "attend a meeting with De Angelo."

The night of his disappearance, Vitale's daughter, Ann, received a phone call telling her the cheesemaker was "locked up and you'll have to get a bondsman." The anonymous caller hung up before the girl could question him.

FULL JOB QUOTA UP TO PEOPLE

F. D. R. Says Americans Can Also Aid Europe.

WASHINGTON, April 7 (U. P.)—President Roosevelt told his advisory board on war mobilization and reconversion today that Americans "can give victory the rich meaning of full employment in the United States and of assistance to other nations in their reconstruction."

"Victory, without the use of abundance of the powers we have developed in production for war, would be indeed, a hollow victory," the President said in a letter to Board Chairman O. Max Gardner.

The letter was a reply to a pledge by the 12-man board to the President that his best efforts would be turned to "the preparation of a broad program of public and private action at the earliest possible time."

The advisory board said in a letter to Mr. Roosevelt it was firmly convinced that "full employment can and will be attained here in the United States."

Urge Positive Role'

"It can be achieved under our system of competing, free enterprise," the board told the President in the conversion period, bold ventures by all our citizens are necessary and the role of government must be positive."

"Veterans returning when war is finally at an end will then find a respected and secure place in the economic life of the nation," the board said.

The nation "can and will" help the needy in devastated lands abroad, the board added.

The President's reply said he agreed "completely" with the advisory board's confidence.

"You have well stated the program by which we fight a victorious war and seek a meaningful peace," the President said.

BOARD WILL HEAR CHURCH PETITION

The Presbyterian church of Indiana has petitioned the city zoning board for authority to erect a church to cost \$20,000 now and ultimately \$50,000, at 1602 E. 59th st.

The petition, which will be heard by the board Monday at 3:30 p. m., was signed by Dr. Alexander E. Sharp, executive secretary of the Indiana synod of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. The lot to be acquired by the church measures 145 by 290 feet and is owned by Elmer Dawson.

Former Indiana Supreme Court Judge H. Nathan Swaim of Indianapolis was named by President Roosevelt today to a three-member emergency board to investigate a dispute between the Missouri and Pacific Railroad Co. and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen.
