

Ask Prayers For Nations

Christians and Jews to Join In Conference Vigil.

Indianapolis laymen and ministers of various faiths will ask divine guidance for the United Nations conference which opens Wednesday in San Francisco.

Christians and Jews will meet for prayer, without a sermon, tomorrow from 3:30 to 4 p.m. in the World War Memorial building. Pastors will dedicate Sunday morning worship to the success of the conference deliberations. And Protestants of all denominations will keep a prayer vigil Tuesday through Friday in the Second Presbyterian church.

The Most Rev. Joseph E. Ritter, archbishop of Indianapolis, has designated tomorrow a day of prayer and given permission for the Blessed Sacrament to be exposed for adoration for the entire day or part of it.

Says Now Is The Time

Public devotions for the conference will be held in all churches and chapels of the archdiocese. Archbishop Ritter said of the coming conference:

"This is a matter of tremendous importance for the future peace of the world. As Catholics, we owe it to our country and to the Holy Father, as well as to ourselves, to extend every effort to bring about a lasting peace in the world. However, now is the time to do this while plans are being formulated and decided upon; later on it will be too late."

Dr. Howard J. Baumgartel, executive secretary of the Indianapolis Church federation, will open the meeting of prayer in the War Memorial building. Rabbi Israel Chodosh, spiritual director of the Temple Beth-El Zedek, will participate in the service as will the Rev. Almon Coble, chairman of the committee on international justice and goodwill of the church federation.

21 Leaders to Assist

The vigil of prayer in the Second Presbyterian church will be in session from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday and from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Friday. During the week, leaders from 21 different churches will assist.

For more than two years, Indianapolis churches have been conducting study classes and presenting lectures on "The Churches and a Just and Durable Peace." Their efforts to plan for peace came to a climax last week in seminars led by Dr. Harold E. Fey of Chicago. Then they formulated their ideas on peace and voted to ask God's direction of the United Nations conference.

World Security Body

"The iron is hot," says Dr. Robert M. Hopkins, president of the UNITED CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, speaking of the coming conference. "The way is now open to establish the worldwide security body, united nations, if you please, that may do for the world what the United States has so admirably done in the maintenance of peace and security on the North American continent."

"Let us therefore accept the Duarion Oaks proposals for 'just what they are—the beginnings of the new world order' for which the whole world longs. Let us magnify these strong points and commend them for what they actually propose to achieve."

"Then in the years ahead, beginning at San Francisco, Wednesday, let us patiently and constructively work for the achievement of that which ultimately should be likened to the kingdom of God proclaimed by our Lord, himself."
