Hoosier Heroes: Bourne, Chandler and Rybolt Killed on Western Front, Local Captain Missing in Pacific Area

DEAD—

An infantryman, Pfc. Robert R. Rybolt, husband of Mrs. Frances M. Rybolt, 2430 Howard st., and son of Mrs. Edith Rybolt, 2537 W. Morris st., was killed April 15 in action in Germany.

A former employee of Bert Sie-
noff Hides, Pfc. Rybolt had been
overseas approximately six months
and had entered the army last June.
He had attended Technical high
school and was 25.

Surviving besides the wife and
mother, are three children, Harold
Gene, 5; Richard M., 2, and Shirley
Ann, 10 months old; two other
brothers in service, Sgt. Frank Ry-
bolt, now back in the states after
serving in the South Pacific, and
Pvt. Calvin C. Rybolt, in Italy;
and six other brothers, Charles,
Frederick, William Harold, Russell,
Louis, and Joseph, and three sisters,
Doris, Lucille, and Barbara.

Previously wounded Jan. 13 in
combat, S. Sgt. James R. Chandler,
son of Mr. and Mrs. Shelly Chandler,
917 N. Jefferson ave., was killed
April 3 in action in Germany.

Fighting with the 14th armored
division of the 7th army, Sgt.
Chandler had returned to the front
just one month before his death.
He was 36 and had been employed
as an adjuster by the Commercial
Credit Co. He was a native of
Melton, Ky.

Surviving besides the parents, are
a brother, Cpl. John Chandler, in
all of Indianapolis.

During heavy fighting in France
when our telephone communications
were constantly disrupted by enemy
artillery barrages, Sgt. Tabata traced
the line six times and repaired it
while under artillery fire," reads
the citation.

"On the last trip out he was
wounded by a shell fragment, but
despite his wound, doggedly con-
tinued at his task, located and re-
paired the break to re-establish
communication."

A graduate of Technical high
school, he attended Butler universi-
ty where he was a member of
Sigma Nu fraternity. He was em-
ployed by Eli Lilly & Co. before
enlisting in the marine corps Oct.
1, 1943, and went overseas last July.
His parents believe the Iwo Jima
campaign was his first combat
action.

Pvt. Ernest Walls, husband of
Mrs. Josephine Walls, Box 151,
Lawrence, was wounded April 11
in Germany, according to word re-
ceived by his wife. He is an in-
fantryman and has been overseas
since January. Mrs. Walls and the
