The Home Is Theme in Local Churches.

Dr. Wallace T. McAfee of Chicago will discuss "The Basic Relationships of Men and Women and Their Effects on Family Life" at the meeting for Indianapolis ministers Monday at 10:30 a. m. in the Roberts Park Methodist church.

The speaker and the subject were chosen because of national Family week, tomorrow through Mother's day, May 13. Dr. McAfee is pastor of the Normal Park Presbyterian church and a candidate for a Ph. D. degree at the University of Chicago. He is a specialist in the field of pastoral and family relations. Other events follow:

After the sermon the church family will gather for their annual May breakfast in the social rooms.

THIRD CHRISTIAN CHURCH—The congregation will hold a special service with Family week theme, followed by dinner Thursday night.

CHRISTIAN MEN BUILDERS—Third Christian church—Mrs. Natalie Brown, accompanist, will play and Marie Siderer will speak on "Justice or Force" at 9:30 a. m. tomorrow.

NORTH METHODIST CHURCH—Mrs. Mary Dye Beach of Shortridge high school will speak during the 8 o'clock period of the Anguish Hour for Youth tomorrow night in the church. Dr. Dallas L. O'Dell will give the sermon, "Why Be Good?" at 10:30 a. m. tomorrow.

EVANS CLASS—East Tenth Street Methodist church—Dr. E. Burdette Backus, minister, will speak tomorrow to the class of 1937, the teacher, Allen Conner, and the class, "The Anguish Hour for Youth" tomorrow night in the church. Dr. Dallas L. O'Dell will give the sermon, "Why Be Good?" at 10:30 a. m. tomorrow.

FELLOWSHIP YOUTH RALLY TOMORROW—Youth of the Westminster Presbyterian will hold their spring rally tomorrow afternoon and evening at the Southport high school.

In addition to Mildred Trib, who has been appointed organist, other musicians will play various instruments on the 10:15 a. m. program. The young people have paid half the cost of the new organ. The Rev. Charles W. Wilson is pastor.

MIXED QUARTET SINGS—The Volunteers of America will present the Indianapolis Mixed quartet, directed by Charles Daugherty and Derrick Allwyn, boy soprano, in a musical program tomorrow at 7:30 p. m. in the chapel. The Rev. Meade Reynolds will speak.

ADVERSITY STRUCK—The original congregation of 11 members built a church at the corner of New York and Ohio streets, costing \$5000. By 1866, the membership increased to 400. Then adversity struck, the congregation reacting to a cleavage in the denomination. The church was sold and

its membership dwindled to a mere 27. But the spirit of the founding fathers of the First U. B. church did not die.

Another church was built in 1880 in the Coburn addition, followed by still another in 1898 at 21st and Central, which cost \$3000. Conditions continued to improve until the most imposing structure so far in 1907 was erected at Park and St. Clair streets for \$12,000.

Tomorrow the "cathedral church" of United Brethren of this community will give lasting expression of affection and respect for the bishop emeritus by including his name with its own. From then on the church will be called "The First United Brethren Church, a Memorial to Bishop H. H. Fout, D. D."

First U. B. Church to Burn Mortgage, Honor Bishop

Congregation and guests will mark the 100th anniversary of the First United Brethren church with a festive celebration tomorrow.

Dr. Virgil G. Hunt, superintendent of the White River conference, will open the service at 10:30 a. m. by burning the final note of the church's \$50,000-dollar mortgage. Bishop Fred L. Dennis of the Northwest area will follow with the centennial sermon.

The program will come to a climax with a civic tribute to Emeritus Bishop H. H. Fout presented by Wallace O. Lee. Mr. Lee will speak for the business and professional men of all faiths in Indianapolis. Later in the year, men of the city expect to pay permanent honor to Bishop Fout with a bronze plaque to be hung in the building.

Bishop Dennis will dedicate the church and Bishop Fout also will speak.

Built in 1921 The grey Gothic First U. B. church stands at the corner of Park ave. and Walnut st. just beyond the noise of Massachusetts ave. It was built in 1921, with a seating capacity of 1500 and a 70-foot tower, at a cost of \$150,000. Its mortgage of \$50,000 has been liquidated since 1934 during the ministry of the pastor, Dr. George F. Snyder.

Five boys seated on the curbstone listening to Bible stories told by E. J. Rood in 1933 formed the nucleus of the present U. B. Builders class. Many of the boys are now fighting on world battlefronts. Mr. Rood continues to teach the class of several hundred and to direct its seven-day recreational program. The shifting employees of neighborhood factories furnish the church and class with what they call a "coming and going element."

"Mingling with long-time members they create a democratic spirit with all social barriers wiped out," was a church official's comment.
