First U. B. Church to Burn Mortgage, Honor Bishop

Congregation and guests will mark the 100th anniversary of the First United Brethren church with a festive celebration tomorrow.

Dr. Virgil G. Hunt, superintendent of the White River conference, will open the service at 10:30 a. m. by burning the final note of the church's \$55,000-dollar mortgage. Bishop Fred L. Dennis of the North-West area will follow with the centennial sermon.

The program will come to a climax with a civic teatime for Emeritus Bishop H. H. Fout presented by Wallace O. Lee. Mr. Lee will speak for the business and professional men of all faiths in Indianapolis. Later in the year, men of the city expect to pay permanent honor to Bishop Fout with a bronze plaque to be hung in the building.

Bishop Dennis will dedicate the church and Bishop Fout also will speak.

Built in 1921

The grey Gothic First U. B. church stands at the corner of Park ave. and Walnut st. just beyond the noise of Massachusetts ave. It was built in 1921, with a seating capacity of 1500 and a 70-foot tower, at a cost of \$150,000.

Its mortgage of \$65,000 has been liquidated since 1934 during the ministry of the pastor, Dr. George F. Snyder.

**RITTER TO ATTEND
O'HARA CEREMONY**

The Most Rev. Joseph E. Ritter, archbishop of Indianapolis, will attend the installation of Bishop John J. O'Hara as bishop of Buffalo, Tuesday in Buffalo, N. Y.

Bishop O'Hara is a former local resident and one time president of Notre Dame university.

Tomorrow afternoon, Archbishop Ritter will confirm a group of first grade children in SS. Peter and Paul's cathedral. The children will receive their first holy communion in the morning.
