Federal Inspection of Meat Gives
City Folks Short End of Horn Now

MEAT-HUNGRY CITY FOLKS, who hear you can get plenty of pork chops and T-bone steaks in rural areas, often attribute it to the "black market" or OPA or a breakdown in our distributive system.

They forget that all government meat buying, for military, lend-lease and other purposes, comes from the big, federally inspected plants which gives the small, non-federally inspected packer more of a chance to sell civilian customers.

The "embalmed beef" scandals of the Spanish-American war and upon Sinclair's exploitation in "The Jungle," of conditions in the Chicago stock yards, brought about federal inspection of pack-houses.

Now about 70 per cent of the U. S. meat comes from plants federally inspected (because they sell across state borders). The others can't sell outside their home state, and thus their customers don't have to divide with the government buyers.

WABASH "COLLEGE" may be the "poor man's Harvard" but that doesn't mean it can't make ends meet itself. As a matter of fact, for the fifth straight year Wabash has ended up with a surplus in its bank account—\$18,000 this last year.

In the music world, Jimmy Dorsey, king of the saxophone, sports the reputation of being one of the few "big name" band leaders still swinging in the original, true jazz tradition.

Jimmy has managed to retain a certain amount of pure jazz right in there with the "all together now" commercial stuff the bobby sock brigade gobbles up with relish. All this is true of the solid stage show he presents at the Circle this week.

Dyed-in-the-wool jazz fans will like Dorsey's improvisations on the sax best of all, although he does give a few of his boys free reign in some of the jump numbers. Marvin Wright is no slouch on the keyboard, a fact he demonstrates with verve in "J. D.'s Boogie Woogie."
