rooms, 1/4 lb. veal luncheon meat,

10 oz. cooked spaghetti, grated cheese

if desired.

Pan-fry onions in drippings until

golden brown. Push onions to one

side of skillet and add flour to fat

in pan. Blend well and heat until

brown. Do not scorch. Gradually

add tomatoes and cook until mix-

ture thickens. Stir constantly. Add

next 4 ingredients and simmer all

together for 10 mins. Pour over hot

spaghetti and serve immediately

with grated cheese. Serves 4.
