# WORKERS' AVERAGE BOND PLEDGE \$89

An average war bond pledge of \$89.64 in the current drive by workers in groups of 25 or more is greater than for any previous campaign.

J. Perry Meek, payroll savings man of the county war finance committee, said today, however, that the figure still is short of the goal of \$100 for each of the 144,499 employees covered by his division's canvass.

To date, a total of 135,569 workers have signed pledges. The mighty 7th campaign quota is 50 per cent higher than the previous drive quota.

Mr. Meek praised workers in his group for their thoroughness. He said 87 per cent of the 658 firms in the county with 25 or more workers have accepted drive quotas. Their objective is to obtain 100 per cent acceptance and then to arrange for the actual purchase of the bonds, Mr. Meek declared.

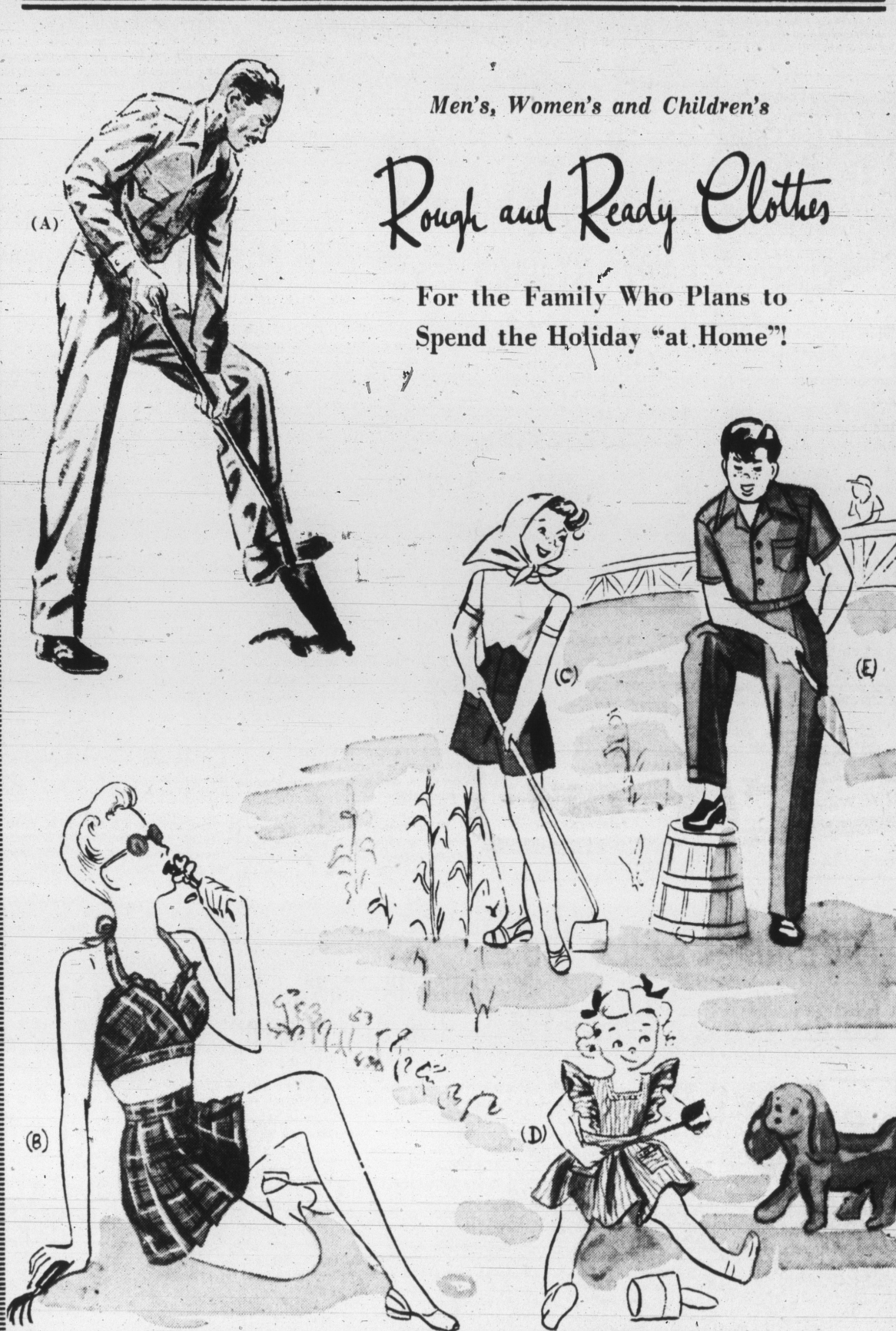
