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STEAKS GALORE --IN ARGENTINA

War Has Made Menu Cheap
And Juicy.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, June 13.—Argentines like to call themselves the best fed people in the world. And the war has made their menu even juicier.

A filet mignon—two inches thick and six inches in diameter—now costs 35 to 45 cents in United States money. A half of French fried potatoes cost an additional 8 to 15 cents.

So even small income families are seldom wanting for plenty of good food. A half chicken costs about 35 cents in the average restaurant. The Chateaubriand steak, one of the choicest, rarely runs over 45 cents. Hors d'oeuvres that come with a 20-cent cocktail are reminiscent of the old free lunch counter days.

There are enough small sandwiches, peanuts, cheese squares, potato chips, olives and other small morsels served free to provide a meal for people of many countries.

YOUR GARDEN . . . By Henry L. Free

Annuals Require Frequent Cuttings to Assure Blooms

Unless you cut annual flowers regularly and keep their blooms from going to seed, the plants will soon stop blossoming, and there will be no picture for you to enjoy or blooms to use for indoor decoration.

Most annuals readily lend themselves for flower arrangement, but without cosmos, Chinese forget-me-not, Blue Moon scabiosa, calendula, salpiglossis, Drummond's phlox, and stocks, few bouquets would be as pleasing. With most of these, cuttings may continue until frost cuts them down.

Old Favorites

There is still time to sow seed of calendula, cosmos and Drummond's phlox. Seeding plants of the others should be purchased at florist and garden shops and set out immediately. And, quite naturally, annuals prefer a good soil, well drained and plenty of sunshine, with watering whenever the soil becomes dry.

Cosmos are old favorites and one of the easiest flowers to grow. Always popular, they are more so now due to the introduction of the velvety dark red, pink and white double-crested varieties, and the brilliant new orange flare and orange ruffles.

Chinese forget-me-not (Cynoglossum), with graceful, loose sprays of various blues, are among the best the annuals offer in that color, and are of easy culture in any soil. Try Fairy Blue, 30 inches tall, and Firmament, but half as high and covered with bright indigo blue blossoms.

The new giant calendulas, with names such as Apricot, Lemon Queen, Orange King and Moonlight aptly describing the colors, with-

stand heavy frosts and are the last of the annuals to die. But one must be sure to keep cutting to insure continuous blooming.

Salpiglossis is one of the few good flowers that thrive in a hot and dry climate and actually reward you with large flowers in many attractive warm colors. Its blossoms, which are set off by veins of gold, are similar in shape to a petunia, and are borne profusely until late in autumn.

Scabiosa Blue Moon, a four-foot plant with large blossoms of conical shape, sky-blue tinged with lavender, borne on long, strong stems, are ideal for cutting. Other scabiosa, ranging in height from 18 to 36 inches, may be had in colors like salmon-pink, azure-blue, black-purple, sulfur-yellow, scarlet and white. Scabiosas have a soft fragrance and add beauty to the garden picture.

Best in Cool Weather

Stocks—we used to call them "Cut and Come Again"—do best in cool weather and only plants which have made good growth should be set out. Their heavy spikes of handsome fragrant flowers, like small rosettes, are produced in a wide range of soft and distinct shades; many of the flowers are double.

Drummond's Phlox, a most satisfactory annual, begins to bloom in early summer and continues until late autumn if flowers are regularly cut. Excellent for bedding, borders and edgings, as varieties range in height from six to 15 inches. Colors are amazing, from fiery crimson-scarlet down to a wonderful range of soft pastels, and glistening pure white.
