Diana, 3, Sees Her Father And Now She May Get Well

WATERLOO, Ia., June 18 (U. P.).—Having had her daddy home for Father's day was all the medicine tiny, freckled-faced Diana Peel needed today.

Early this month doctors said Diana, 3, was dying. They said she had acute leukemia, a usually fatal blood disease, and that she had only two weeks to live.

Today Diana had improved so much that the physicians said she had a good chance to recover. She had been given the only medicine that would do any good. Her daddy, a wounded sailor from the Pacific, was home from the war.

Girl Subs at Reunion
Seaman 1-c Richard Peel arrived by airplane to be greeted by his wife and Diana. The child sobbed wildly for several minutes and clutched her father around the neck as he balanced himself on crutches in the doorway of the plane.

It was a happy ending for Peel's long journey home from the Pacific. He was wounded May 13 when the destroyer on which he was serving was hit by a Jap suicide plane. For days neither the navy nor Red Cross could locate Peel to tell him his daughter was dying.

Peel, in a Pacific hospital with a severely wounded leg, began to worry about his family because he hadn't heard from home for months. He didn't even know that his wife had given birth to a son.

'A Terrible Shock'
Then authorities found him. They told him the bad news—and the good.

"It was the most terrible shock of my life when they told me my little daughter was dying," he said.

The navy and Red Cross arranged for him to return home. As soon as he arrived at the Mare Island naval hospital in San Francisco, he was given a 30-day furlough and was flown home.

Smiling as he greeted the crowd of friends and relatives, Peel promised: "Diana and I are going to get well together."

Burge, ticket sales director, said.

In ordering tickets, Mr. Burge explained that checks should be made payable to the Indiana University Foundation, orders should include a stamped, self-addressed envelope and should be mailed to Room 307, at 108 E. Washington st. No telephone reservation will be accepted.

Tickets are priced as follows:

Orchestra, \$10; balcony, \$5; upper balcony, \$2.50. Loge seats at \$50 each are available to sponsors of the premiere. All prices include tax.

Following the premiere tickets will be sold at regular prices at Loew's for the rest of the film's run.

Welfare Heads May Be Fired Without Notice, Emmert Rules

County welfare directors may be removed by county welfare boards "without notice, hearing or reason," Indiana Attorney General James A. Emmert ruled today.

In an official opinion, the attorney general said certain "merit" sections of the state personnel act are not applicable to county welfare directors. This is based on the assumption, he pointed out, that an officer serving at the pleasure of an appointing authority may be removed at the discretion of that authority. In this case, county welfare boards name all welfare directors.

Attorney General Emmert declared, however, that any new director must be chosen from an approved list selected under the merit system by the state personnel department.

The attorney general also held that his opinion, exempting county welfare boards from certain merit controls, would not limit county allotments of federal aid.

"The federal social security board has no authority with respect to the selection, tenure or office and compensation of state or county officers so long as the state has a set of approved personnel standards on a merit basis," Mr. Emmert said. He pointed out that Indiana has such a personnel plan which has been approved by the federal board.

He said his opinion would not cancel this approval because the federal social security statute estab-

lishes "no specific requirements for any particular personnel systems."

Heretofore, dismissal of county welfare directors has required a public hearing of charges leveled by county welfare boards. One such dismissal sparked a recent controversy here when Miss Helen Guynn, former Marion county welfare director, was ousted. At a public hearing, Miss Guynn and her attorneys retorted with a storm of protests against her dismissal, and tossed counter-charges back at the welfare board.
