Change of College Course Doesn't Jeopardize Aid

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Here are some general questions from G. I. and their relatives:

Q—Recently my son entered college under the G. I. Bill of Rights. He started taking a pre-law course against my advice. I think he should have started in business administration. Now he finds that my advice was correct and realizes that he is better suited for the business course. He is afraid to change, however, and is afraid the government won't let him. What can he do?

A—If he finds out the first course he elected isn't satisfactory for his needs he is perfectly free to change. He is entitled to as much time in college as the law allows regardless of what he takes.

Q—I received a very serious injury to my leg in Italy and have since been discharged. As yet I haven't tried to get a job. I'm afraid I might not get into the right thing and have a bad mark against my record if I quit. What do you suggest?

A—The United States Employment Service has a special program for placing disabled persons. Have no fear about going to the closest USES office. They will study your case carefully, find a job that you can handle and keep in touch with you to see that things are going all right.

Q—I am soon going on a fur-

lough and will want to use the family car when I get home. I know servicemen get extra gas for that purpose but would appreciate your telling me how I go about getting it and how much I will get.

A—You will get a gallon a day, up to 30 gallons. Apply at any local rationing board. Bring along the mileage rationing record for the car to be used. Have your fur-

lough papers with you.

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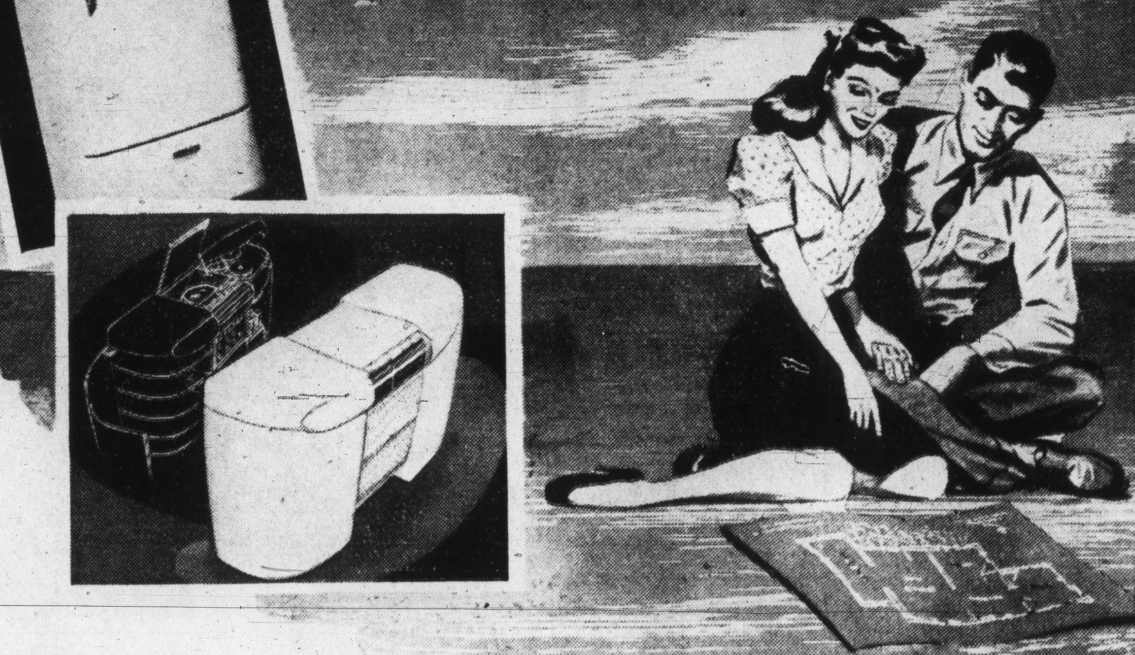
