## Hoosier Heroes: Local Soldier Drowned, 2 Navy Men Missing

A local man has been drowned while on occupation duty in Germany, a navy air force officer has been missing since his first mission over Japan and another naval officer is missing off Okinawa, today's casualty lists report.

Also two Indianapolis men have been wounded in action.

He attended schools in Michigan City and entered the army in August, 1942. Overseas 16 months, he had a daughter, Mary Michael, whom he had never seen.

Sgt. Marshall is the son of Mr. and Mrs. August Marshall, Michigan City.

Ens. William H. Lange, son of Mrs. Margaret Lange, 1434 N. Delaware st., has been missing since July 10. A member of the navy air corps, he was lost on his first mission over Japan.

Overseas five months, Ensign Lange has been in the navy 20 months. He attended Purdue university and is a member of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity. He enlisted during his senior year and was commissioned in April, 1944.

Overseas since September, 1943, Cpl. Everett had been wounded once before on Saipan. He is a graduate of Howe high school and enlisted in December, 1942. He holds the purple heart.

An Indianapolis naval officer, Lt. John R. Mahon, is home now on a 30-day survivor's leave. He was wounded when his minesweeper was attacked in the Borneo area in June.

Lt. Mahon is the husband of Mrs. Jean Mahon, 139 E. 36th st., and is a graduate of Purdue university. He has a daughter, Julie, 18 months. Lt. Mahon holds the purple heart and wears the ribbon for the liberation of the Philippines.
