TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 10 (U. P.).—Rites were arranged today for Max Ehrmann, 72, Indiana author and poet for more than half a century, who died last night in St. Anthony's hospital.

Ehrmann wrote "A Farrago" in 1898 and "The Mystery of Madeline Le Blanc" in 1899. Other books included "A Prayer," "Jesus, a Passion Play," "The Wife of Marobius," "The Seasons," "Desiderata," and several editions of poems. He also wrote "The Life of Paul Dresser," a biography of another Terre Haute writer.

Ehrmann was born in Terre Haute and educated at DePauw university and Harvard university. He held an honorary degree from Harvard.

CHARLES B. DAY


