DEMOCRATS NAME WOMAN PUBLICIST

Lois Compton Fuller has been appointed director of publicity and research for the Democratic state committee. State Chairman Fred Bays announced today.

A native of New Castle, Mrs. Fuller has been a newspaper-woman, author, playwright and teacher. She reported and wrote editorials for Boston newspapers before entering the free-lance writing field. During the 1944 election she wrote publicity for the Roosevelt campaign. Several of her plays have been produced, and a book of children's verse is among her published works. She taught journalism, advertising and dramatic art at St. Mary's college, South Bend.

Mrs. Fuller is the widow of Joseph V. Fuller, historian and writer who taught at Harvard, California and Wisconsin universities and headed the state department research section in Washington at the time of his death. He was a member of the world war I peace negotiating commission and is buried in Arlington National cemetery.

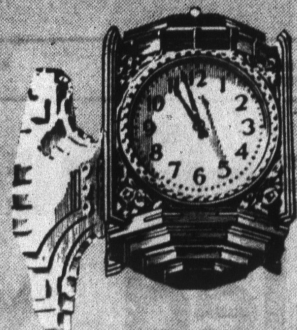
The Indianapolis chapter 392, O. E. S., will hold an initiation and obligation ceremony at 8 p. m. Tuesday at the temple.

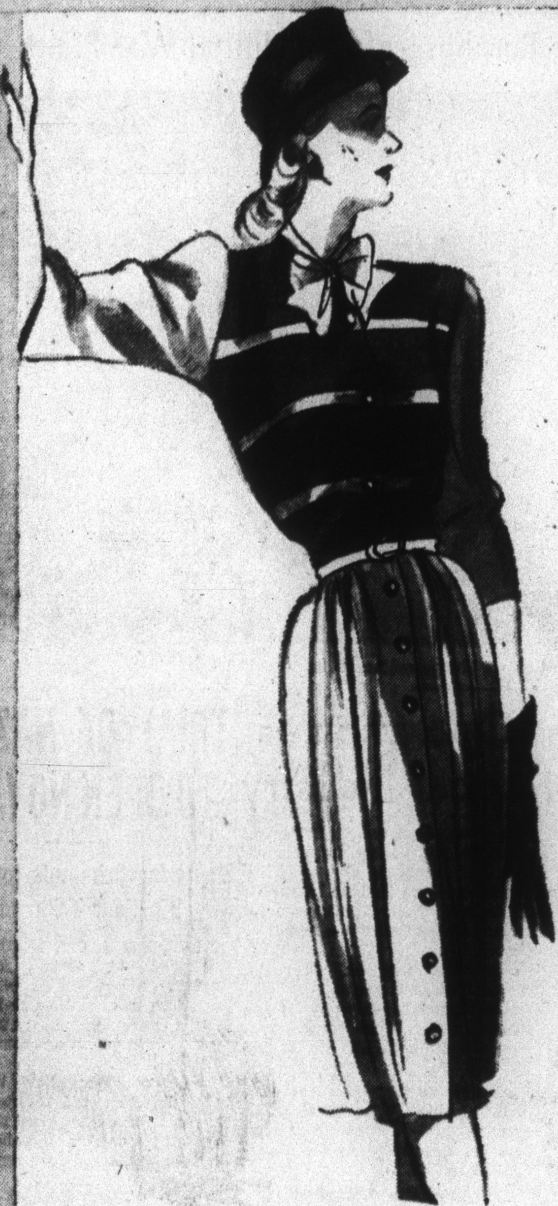

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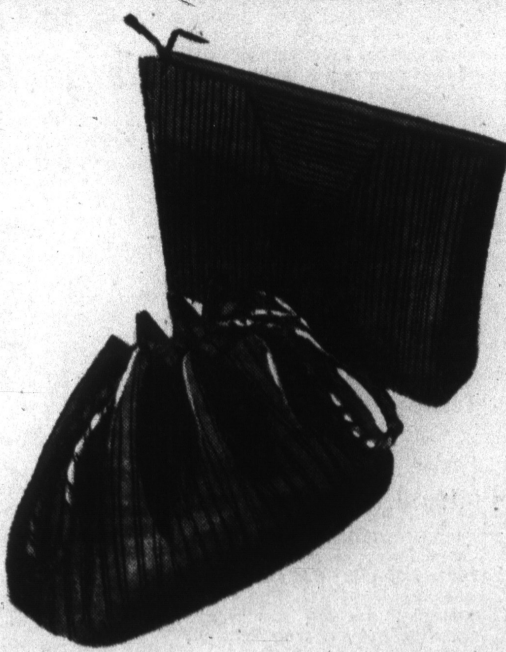
