

# MAN, 76, STRUCK BY CAR, KILLED

Brings City Traffic Death Toll to 56.

A 76-year-old Indianapolis man was killed and five persons were injured in traffic accidents yesterday.

His death brings the total city fatalities for the year to 56 and for both the city and county to 85.

A test pilot for Allison's, Orville R. (Pinky) Grimes, 40, of 114 S. High School rd., received slight injuries when the car he was driving failed to make a turn early today on the Rockville rd., according to police reports.

The car struck a telephone pole in the 4200 block on Rockville rd., where the accident occurred, breaking the pole off and tearing down wires which served a large community. The car was described as a total wreck.

Struck by Streetcar  
Mrs. Margaret Stewart, 75 1/2, Massachusetts ave., was treated at City Hospital last night for head injuries received when she was struck by a streetcar operated by Clarence Stanley, 1521 E. Market st., at Davidson and Washington sts. Her condition was reported as not serious by the police.

Two persons were injured when a car driven by Joseph Confield, 23, of Shoals, Ind., and a car driven by William DeWese, 32, of 318 W. McCarty st., collided at West and Washington sts. early today.

The injured are: Larry De Wese, 8, of 933 S. West st., who had two front teeth knocked out; and Jessie De Wese, of the same address, who was shaken up.
