

PARTY STIRS RACE HATRED

Georgia Group Seeks to
Gain Political Power.

Racial bloc now active in the political affairs of the nation.

The party "platform" contains these statements:

"The right to vote and to hold office shall be limited to white people who are citizens of the United States and to other racial individuals who can qualify under the franchise standard fixed by the constitution and the acts of congress. The legislature of the several states shall establish or designate certain established courts as 'franchise courts' wherein native-born citizens other than white may be granted the right of franchise upon proof of voting qualifications."

"The Commoner party demands that congress proceed at once to make a complete and thorough investigation of international Jew penetration into American business and politics, to determine to what extent Jews have established monopolies in restraint of trade and to what extent Jews have entered the United States illegally during the present war."

"The Commoner party believes that economic trends must be accepted and followed implicitly, patriotically and courageously if democracy is to be sustained as the guiding philosophy of this 'white man's nation.' The general economic welfare of the whole people must be recognized as paramount to profit and swollen fortunes for the few."

"Shipp says he began 'thinking seriously about the Jew-Negro problem back in 1913 because of an attempt to railroad a Negro to the gallows to save the life of a worthless Atlanta Jew.'"

"I'm in full sympathy with religious and economic rights for Negroes," Shipp says. "The Negro has been used by others for what they might gain. Jews take advantage of Negroes. They cheat them on merchandise and don't pay them fairly for their work."

Denies Direct Klan Tieup

"I'm going 100 per cent for organized labor. However, the Jewish control of labor will eventually wreck it."

"I'm pro-Catholic. My wife is a member of the high Episcopal church and my grandfather was a Methodist minister."

"Some members of the Ku Klux Klan are associated with us, but there is no direct tie-up between the two organizations."

Shipp says he had "agreeable correspondence" with Gerald L. K. Smith and the American First party.

He says Carl Mote, Indiana hate peddler who served as chairman of the American First convention in Detroit last year, "is a splendid man."

He corresponds with Father Arthur W. Terminiello, the "Father Coughlin of Alabama," Vance Muse, director of the anti-labor Christian American, Inc., and former Senator Robert R. Reynolds, who established the Nationalist party.

Asked whether the Commoner party is working in co-operation with America First, Christian American, Carl Mote and other disruptionists, Shipp replied:

"Where their programs are in line with my program we, naturally, are in the same road. Therefore, in that case, we are working together."

Shipp says contributions "to the party ranged from 'very small amounts' to 'substantial sums.'"

There is no "visible evidence" that the Commoners are spending large amounts of money or that they have many members.

But a steady stream of anti-Semitic, anti-Negro propaganda flows from party headquarters on the Shipp farm.

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energy and bombs in a crowded room brilliantly illuminated by the lights of photographers and cameramen.

Sachs, who had previously been in close contact with President Roosevelt on other matters, said he went to the White House on Oct. 11, 1939, with a letter from Prof. Albert Einstein warning of possible consequences to this country of atomic research then going on in Germany.

Sachs said foreign-born scientists in this country as refugees from fascism or nazism, supplied Mr. Roosevelt with much of the information which motivated him in throwing this government into atomic research.

When the President was presented with this evidence, Sachs said, he turned to his aid, the late Maj. Gen. Edwin (Pa) Watson and made the remark which put the United States into the race.

Sachs said such refugee scientists as Einstein and Dr. Leo Szilard went to him first because I was in a position to talk to the President. They knew that Germany was organized to carry out atomic experiments without stint and were fearful that the safety of the United States would be greatly endangered.

Following instructions from the President, Sachs said, Watson immediately began to assemble a group of scientists and naval and military representatives to work on the problem.

"One advantage this country had (in the atomic race) was the way in which the refugee scientists responded to freedom," Sachs said. "They were like the Pilgrim fathers when they landed on the shores of this continent. They were eager to serve."

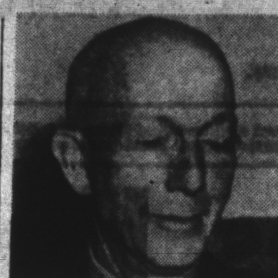
The committee later will hear Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, who co-ordinated atomic bomb production for the army.

Veteran Medical Officer Is New Wakeman Commander

TROUBLED WORLD—

Jewish Strike in Palestine Is Called Following Raids

JERUSALEM, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—A 30-minute Jewish strike was called throughout Palestine for 1:30 p. m. today.

Mezharim villages of the Sharon valley bursted the nine men killed in yesterday's raid by 10,000 British airborne troops.

The Jewish council ordered the demonstration in an atmosphere of extreme tension which threatened to break into open fighting.

"The battle has begun," one Jewish leader shouted at a mass meeting last night.

At least 80 persons were wounded in the mass raid by British infantry, supported by armor and fighter planes, on six villages north of Tel Aviv in search of Jewish extremists who attacked two British coast guard stations. Eighty Jews and 12 policemen were wounded.

At midnight, the 10,000 British troops which had swooped on the Sharon valley returned to their bases, easing dangers of an immediate clash. The curfew on movement between villages was lifted.

Nevertheless, passions touched off by the raid were near the flash point. Tension could only be compared with that which existed just before the battle of El Alamein, when the Jews feared that the German army would sweep across Egypt to Palestine.

Mass meetings in Haifa last night condemned the British amid exhortations from Jewish leaders.

The British announced that 21 persons, including the village chief, were arrested at Shefayim, which the British raided with clubs, tear gas and fixed bayonets. Villagers resisted behind barricades.

A supply of ammunition, explosives, military uniforms and German and Greek currency were found in the village, the British announcement said.

British Air, Sea Arms
Still Maul Indonesians

BATAVIA, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—Fierce fighting was reported continuing today in central Java where British forces have opened both air and sea attacks on Indonesian extremists.

Hard-pressed Indian troops were reported battling new attacks around Ambarawa where extremists have been besieging 8,000 to 10,000 civilians in an internment camp.

British planes strafed Indonesian positions yesterday and dropped food to the internees.

The Netherlands News Agency reported that other R. A. F. planes bombed an Indonesian stronghold in Semarang, 20 miles north, while the British heavy cruiser Sussex shelled the villages of Demok and Ungaran west and south of the port.

The Indonesian national convention in Batavia passed a resolution yesterday calling the British for the events in Java because "they are trying to make a second Manchuria of Java on behalf of the Dutch."

U. S. Orders Forces
Out of Iran by Jan. 1

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—The United States, leading a move to clear Iran of foreign troops, already has ordered American forces and installations evacuated from the troubled Near Eastern country by the end of December.

Orders for the evacuation went out shortly after the state department, in notes to Moscow and London, proposed a three-power agreement for removal of all American, British and Russian forces from Iran by Jan. 1.

Iranian officials have charged that the presence of foreign troops was responsible for the unrest in their country.

The United States also expects to evacuate American troops from Czechoslovakia by the end of this week. Dispatches from Prague confirmed that Russian military evacuation was generally keeping pace with the American withdrawal, but may require more time because Red army forces are more scattered.

After Dec. 1 the Czechoslovak army will be in practical command of all airfields, military communications and garrisons.

Important air bases on the long route to India and China will be abandoned in the evacuation of Iran.

Orlando Withdraws
From Italy's Crisis

ROME, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—Victor Emmanuel Orlando, Italy's world war I leader, took himself out of the Italian political crisis today with the announcement that he would not serve as premier in a new coalition government.

Orlando forestalled an unofficial move to push him into the premier's job by informing Crown Prince Umberto that he would refuse the post if it were offered officially.

His decision was announced after a series of conferences with leaders of the various Italian political parties had uncovered strong left-wing opposition to his appointment.

Peron Followers
Stage Racial 'Raid'

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—Supporters of Col. Juan D. Peron attempted to invade headquarters of the Hebrew Society of Argentina last night in a renewal of anti-Jewish demonstrations.

A number of shots were fired during fighting with a group of alleged Jews who reacted to shouted anti-racial slogans, but none was injured.

Police, escorting the Peronists, were said to have arrested three Jews.

Coal, Steel Strikes
Spread in Australia

SYDNEY, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—Spreading coal and steel strikes threatened today to paralyze all Australian industry.

All colliery workers in the Newcastle area struck today in sympathy with workers at the Newcastle steel works which have been idle for the last 10 days. The company's associated steel plant in Port Kembla has been idle nine weeks.

A-BOMBS NOT ON
CHUTES, EXPERTS SAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (U. P.).—The atomic bombs that blasted Hiroshima and Nagasaki were not falling and were not attached to parachutes, it was learned today.

This information, confirmed by army atomic bomb experts, reversed a contrary impression created by Japanese claims that the Hiroshima bomb was seen floating above the city from a parachute just before the blast.

Actually, it was revealed, the Japs did see a parachute but it was not carrying the bomb. Instead, it was bearing sensitive instruments which were going on inside the bomb.

The crew of the bomb-dropping B-29 was thereby kept advised until the split second of the explosion.

both the Allison and Chevrolet factories, and at the Allison testing laboratory at Weir Cook airport. Although police details guarded municipal property at Weir Cook airport, Inspector Donald Tooley forbade police to "enter into any controversy with either side as to their rights in the matter."

The McQuay-Norris stoppage, said Leslie Towner, sub-director of the C. I. O.-U. A. W. St. Louis council, is part of a nation-wide strike of McQuay-Norris units. He said the union is demanding a 30 per cent wage increase and concessions pertaining to seniority, grievances and working conditions.

A McQuay-Norris plant at Connersville is also affected.

Raymond F. Crown, local McQuay-Norris manager, said the strike was nationally-directed and not a result of local differences.

Lock-Out Claimed

At the Insley Manufacturing Co., A. F. of L. employees claim they were "locked out." W. A. Albrecht, plant personnel manager, called the stoppage a "strike." He said the union had made no demands.

"Frankly," he said, "it's hard to tell what it's all about."

The national labor relations board today set up polling places in 16 plants in 10 Indiana cities where members of the C. I. O. United Steelworkers will vote tomorrow on whether to strike for a \$2-a-day wage increase.

NLRB representatives said that balloting would be open to an estimated 7,000 eligible voters in five plants at Indianapolis, two each at Muncie and Terre Haute, and one each at Ft. Wayne, Frankfort, Kokomo, Akron, Elwood, Evansville and Crawfordsville.

Approximately 9,000 members of the United Packing House Workers (C. I. O.) are scheduled to ballot in eight Indiana plants next Friday on whether to strike in their demands for a blanket 25-cents-an-hour wage increase.

The national labor relations board said that voting was scheduled for two plants in Indianapolis, Ft. Wayne and Evansville, and one each in Muncie and Ft. Branch.

divisions of the state department as my supervisor."

In such positions, he continued, "Most of them have continued to side with the Communist armed party and at times with the imperialist bloc, against American policy."

The secrecy which has attended our conduct of foreign affairs has enabled underlings in the state department to defeat our announced objectives, in Gen. Hurley's opinion.

"I grant that sometimes during the war we had to be expedient," he said. "Now, we should endeavor to be just. I am firmly convinced that an informed public opinion would do much to give intelligent direction to our international objectives."

Gen. Hurley declared he was willing to have all his official reports made public, "together with the reports made by those officials in the foreign service" who had differed with him.

Gen. Hurley urged an early clarification of our aims. He charged that because of the confusion in our international policy, "America has been excluded economically from every part of the world controlled by colonial imperialism and Communist imperialism."

Yet with the danger that these conflicting "predatory ideologies" will lead to a third world war, he declared, "we are supporting the imperialist bloc," while at the same time "a considerable section of the state department is endeavoring to support communism."
