RUSSIA BALKS AT PROPOSAL FOR IRAN

LONDON, Jan. 2 (U. P.).—The foreign office revealed today that Russia reacted unfavorably to a British proposal at the Moscow conference to set up a three-power commission to handle the problem of Iran.

Conceding the Big Three failure to reach any decision regarding Iran, a foreign office spokesman said:

"We favored a three-power commission, but the reaction of the Soviet government was not favorable. We still feel that if it could be brought about, it would be a very good idea."

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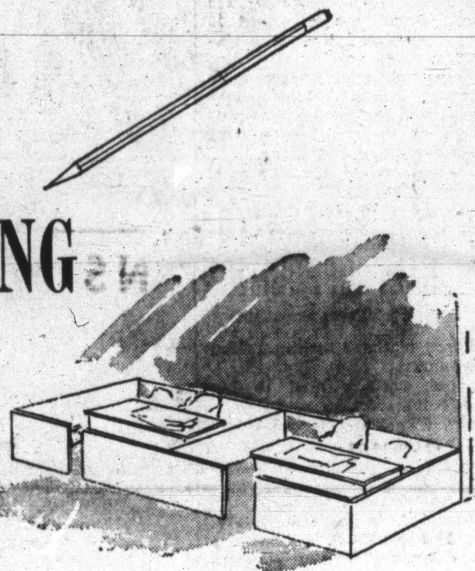


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
