

GROUP FORMED TO AID STRIKERS

Financial Assistance for Families Is Aim.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (U. P.).—A group of prominent Americans, including Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt and churchmen of all faiths, has been formed to give financial aid to the families of striking General Motors workers, it was announced today.

Members of the committee include: Mrs. Roosevelt; former Treasury Secretary Henry Morgenthau Jr.; former OPA Chief Leon Henderson; Bernard J. Shell, Catholic auxiliary bishop of Chicago; Episcopal Bishop William J. Carroll of Missouri; and Edward L. Ransburg, retired, of California; Methodist Bishop G. Bronley Oxnam; Rabbi Stephen Wise; Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, of the Union Theological Seminary, New York; Russell Davenport, writer and associate of the late Wendell Willkie; Marine Col. Evans Carlson; Walter White, president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People; Elizabeth Janeway, New York novelist, secretary, and Llewellyn Ross, New Canaan, Conn., business man, treasurer.

Hitler's Job Too Big, Goering Says

NUERNBERG, Jan. 3 (U. P.).—Hermann Goering has told allied officers that if he had succeeded Adolf Hitler, he planned to discard the "fuehrer principle" and set up a cabinet to which he would have been responsible.

Goering was described today in reports of his decision as believing that no one man was capable of such momentous acts as were the lot of the leader of Germany.

The long-designated successor to Hitler also was reported to have said that he did not believe the Nazis' own philosophy of the "fuehrer principle."

He said Hitler doubtless was a "genius of leadership," but believed no one person could be solely responsible for governing a country the size of Germany.

CLAIMS REPORT OF MACARTHUR HUSHED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (U. P.).—Senator Homer E. Capehart (R., Ind.) yesterday asked the war department to explain why Secretary of State James F. Byrnes was not informed about Gen. Douglas MacArthur's opposition to the four-power control council for Japan.

He asked Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson to do the explaining. Mr. Capehart said Gen. MacArthur objected to the council in a report to the joint chiefs of staff Oct. 31.

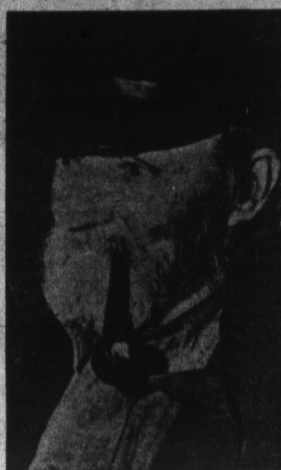
Mr. Capehart said war department failure to relay the opinion to Byrnes "may be regarded as an incident which shows lack of coordination and might, to some extent, explain the mess into which our foreign affairs have fallen."

Mr. Capehart also complained that agreements reached at Moscow "have not been given to the public clearly."

"If the Moscow agreements are pointless conversations which are in no way binding on anybody, and can be broken at will by any participant, let's hear the truth, so we can apply it in our international thinking," Mr. Capehart said.

"If they are binding contracts which may at some time require the approval of the senate, let's get the background now, while it's fresh in the minds of those who helped to make them. It will save a lot of headaches later."

SHELLS BLAST AWAY, BUT VILLAGERS STAY

MARLBOROUGH, Wiltshire, England, Jan. 3 (U. P.).—Six inhabitants of Cadley in Savernake forest, defying orders to evacuate, ducked every few minutes today as shells and bullets exploded in a burning ammunition train nearby.

Two cars in the ammunition train exploded at a British camp yesterday afternoon killing one soldier and injuring four. Ten others were reported missing. No American soldiers were involved.

Flames spread and set off explosions in seven other cars fully loaded with ammunition.

Troops, firemen and other civilians evacuated the area last night to await daylight for resuming a battle against the flames.

But the six villagers, including an 83-year-old man and his 80-year-old wife who had lived in Cadley all their lives, refused to budge.

Their son, F. W. Burridge, telephoned Marlborough early today and reported explosions were occurring every few minutes and bullets and shells "were whizzing through the air and going off like firecrackers."
