4 DEAD, 11 HURT IN PORTLAND, ME., FIRE

PORTLAND, Me., Jan. 7 (U. P.)—Trapped by raging sheets of flame which enveloped a four-story frame apartment house, four persons perished and 11 others were injured today. Firemen rescued 35 others.

The fire started in a rear basement and quickly spread up a staircase to the top floor.

The dead: Joyce Kellan, 16, whose body was discovered under a fourth-floor bathtub where she apparently tried to shield herself from the blaze.

Mrs. Kellan, her grandmother, Archie Paradis, 80. His daughter, Marilyn, 15.

Mrs. Elota Settle, 37, suffered a neck fracture when she jumped from her fourth-story window. Mrs. Beatrice Johnson, 49, broke her back and neck in a leap from the third story.
