New W. 16th League Plans to Seek Neighborhood Reforms

The newly formed W. 16th St. Civic league launched its 1946 program today following a mass meeting last night.

With its second meeting passed, the league already numbers 140 members and expects to total 500 in the near future as its campaign expands.

Bound by 16th St., rd. 52, Tibbs Ave. and White river, residents are gaged to achieve reforms.

Top on the "must" list are sidewalks for W. 16th St. which now is being considered for re-pavement; better surface drainage; improved lighting and sewage disposal and cross-town bus service on Belmont Ave. linking the area to the factories and Washington high school to the south.

AIRPLANE SPOTS TRIO LOST IN SNOWSTORM

REDDING, Cal., Jan. 9 (U.P.)—Two boys and a girl who disappeared in a snowstorm in Lassen national forest were safe today after rescuers found them in an abandoned cabin where they took shelter.

The three were June MacDonald, 10, her 12-year-old brother, Rex, and Donald Hammond, 19. They disappeared Sunday between Mineral and Viola, Cal., where they were going skiing.

Merle Larson, civilian airplane pilot, spotted the trio yesterday near Lake Helen, at the summit of Mt. Lassen. Searchers immediately fought their way through a gale to the scene.

Maj. Gen. Hawley Will Speak Here

MAJ. GEN. PAUL R. HAWLEY, acting surgeon general of the veterans administration, will address the 21st annual State Medical association secretaries' conference Saturday at the Columbia club.

The conference will deal primarily with medical-economics, said Dr. Jesse E. Farrell, president of the association. Among discussion topics will be the pre-payment medical care program and relations between the private physician and the veterans administration.

Dr. Charles F. Thompson, chairman of the veterans affairs committee of the association, will share speaking honors with a score of prominent Hoosier doctors.

Dr. William M. Dugan, Indianapolis physician, will assist in the conference arrangements.

KIDNAPING SUSPECT ALSO WANTED HERE

Grover E. Casey, 23, held in St. Louis in connection with the kidnaping and murder of Suzanne Degnan, Chicago, is also wanted by Indianapolis police.

He escaped from the Isolation hospital here last August following his arrest in connection with the holdup of Mrs. Lou Treon, 30, of 2320 Selby St.

Local police were advised that St. Louis would release Casey to them if the FBI did not file kidnaping charges as indicated yesterday. Casey was accused of sending telegrams to the kidnaped girl's parents before her body was found.

3 PARK HOTEL CONTRACTS LET

Lee Waynick to Operate Spring Mill Hostelry.

The Indiana Conservation Commission yesterday awarded the contract for operation of the Spring Mill state park hotel to Lee M. Waynick of Marengo.

The contract, which is for a two-year period, was one of three signed at yesterday's meeting. In addition to the Spring Mill contract, two present operators—Joseph McDonald at Clifty Inn, Clifty Falls state park, and Mrs. Louise Hudson at Dunne Inn, the Dunes—were signed, also for two years.

The five-year contract formerly held by Myron Rees for the operation of the Spring Mill hotel was invalidated last year by Attorney General James Emmert on grounds that Mr. Rees was a member of the conservation department when the contract was awarded and that the former commission overstepped its authority in contracting beyond its term of office.

New Contracts Uniform

The hotel was run in the interim by Mrs. Nina Losey, a hotel employee, under the direction of the commission itself.

Mr. Waynick is a former maintenance superintendent at the state fairgrounds and has had experience in operating theaters and restaurants. He served as a warehouse superintendent for the army air forces at the fairgrounds during the war.

Under the new program of uniform park contracts, agreements also were signed recently with Mrs. Grace Smartt at McCormick's Creek and with Ben Swenson at Pokagon state park. Commission members estimated that under these contracts, the state's share of earnings at Spring Mill, Pokagon and McCormick's Creek would be increased \$75,000 annually.

Mr. Graham, who is in service, was elected in absentia. Other fair board members are holdover members elected at last year's convention for two-year terms.

The board was scheduled to elect its officers later today.
