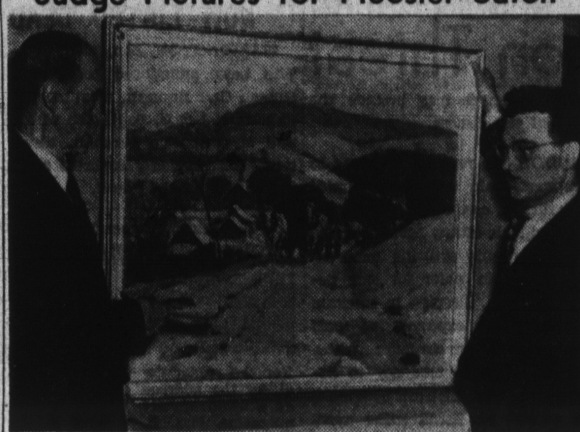

LAST JAP PRISONERS LEAVE U. S. TODAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (U. P.)—
The last Japanese prisoners of war
in the United States are scheduled
to sail for Hawaii and Japan today
from two West Coast ports.

The largest group of 441 able-
bodied prisoners will sail from Los
Angeles for Ft. Shafter, Hawaii,
where they will be used for essen-
tial labor.

A second group of 182 "non-work-
ers," mostly officers and non-com-
missioned officers, will leave Seattle
for Japan.

A total of 543 Japanese war pris-
oners was interned in the U. S. at
one time, the army said. Of these,
2588 already are doing essential
work in Hawaii.

GUNMAN SLATED ON FOUR CHARGES

A man who pulled a gun on two
policemen at Keith's theater faced
at least four charges today.

James W. Lake, 31, who said he
lived in the Hoosier hotel, was

ing a deadly weapon, violation of
the 1935 firearms act and vagrancy.
Three safe-crackers who eluded
police last night escaped with
\$488.06.

It had been chiseled open and the
money taken. Patrolmen Dennis

RIOTS ARE SPREADING IN ITALY AND SICILY

was reported increasing today in
the "work or bread" riots spreading
through Italy and Sicily.

In Rome, unemployed war veter-
ans and former prisoners of war
ransacked black markets and beat
profiteers. After the demonstration
a committee called on Minister of
Interior Giuseppe Romita demand-
ing jobs.

Three carabinieri headquarters
were attacked in Sicily by large for-
mations of bandits.

Gen. Ray E. Por-
ter of the army
general staff. He
was once on the
training staff of the 38th division
when it was stationed at Camp
Shelby.

Major Tyndall, former
commanding general of the 38th,
will introduce him.

Principal speaker at a dinner-
ette Saturday night in the Clay-
pool, honoring V. F. W. national
officers, will be Ray H. Brannaman
of Denver, junior vice commander-
in-chief.

A member of the Colorado Indus-
trial commission, Mr. Brannaman
has been active in consulting with
the veterans administration on
problems of veterans' employment.

His son, Ray Jr., was killed on
Saipan with the marines.

At a public meeting Sunday after-
noon in the World War Memorial,
Rear Adm. Robert Ward Hayler,
now on the navy board in Wash-
ington, will discuss "Winning the
Peace."
