Calls on Management for
"Justice to Workers."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Economic interests of the country and preservation of the capitalist system depend upon big business management recognizing the justice of the strikers' cause, Rep. Charles M. LaFollette, Evansville Republican, declared today.

Mr. LaFollette is seeking the G. O. P. senatorial nomination as a "radical."

His latest support of strikers is stated in a letter he made public, addressed to a General Motors automobile dealer in New Albany, Ind.

This business man had written that he had been able to obtain only one car because of the G. M. strike. Both his prospective customers and he want congress to do something about strikes, the auto dealer wrote.

"I think you and your customers have misplaced your enemy in the General Motors strike," Mr. LaFollette replied.

Cites Company Refusal

PRAGUE, Jan. 21 (Delayed) (U. P.)—Gens. Robert Ryckham and Otto Blaha were hanged in the Pankrac prison courtyard today, three hours after they were convicted of treason for pro-Fascist activity during the war.
