## STRIKE BACKED BY LAFOLLETTE

**Calls on Management for 'Justice to Workers.'**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Economic interests of the country and preservation of the capitalistic system depend upon big business management recognizing the justice of the strikers' cause, Rep. Charles M. LaFollette, Evansville Republican, declared today.

Mr. LaFollette is seeking the G. O. P. senatorial nomination as a "radical."

His latest support of strikers is stated in a letter he made public, addressed to a General Motors automobile dealer in New Albany, Ind.

This business man had written that he had been able to obtain only one car because of the G. M. strikes. Both his prospective customers and he want congress to do something about strikes, the auto dealer wrote.

"I think you and your customers have misplaced your enemy in the General Motors strike," Mr. LaFollette replied.

**Cities Company Refusal**  
"It is the company which has refused to accept the fact-finding board's recommendation on a wage increase, not the workers. It is also a fact that because of reduced war powers and downgrading in mass production industries, our national income is calculated to decrease \$35 billion dollars in 1946."

"This decrease is out of the hands of working people who spend their income and thus make it possible for others to buy your automobiles."

Buying power of the masses must be maintained to service the national debt of \$300 billions the letter continued.

It praised Walter Reuther of the United Automobile Workers (C. I. O.) for his plan to not accept increases if prices would rise on automobiles.

**Favors Strikers**  
LaFollette then concluded:  
"I am bound to say that on the issue involved in the strikes, other than jurisdictional strikes or strikes for the purpose of exerting political pressure, such as is threatened in New York City by the Transport Workers, the interests of the country and of the people who believe in the capitalistic system is represented by the interest of the strikers and not by the manufacturers."

"The big stockholders in General Motors and the highly paid officers will not buy your automobiles in New Albany, nor will they spend enough money in New Albany to provide the professional men, the merchants and the industrial owners of New Albany all together with enough money to buy your automobiles."

**Deplores Inability**  
"But, if, as the result of the efforts of the large unions to retain their buying power, the buying power of the people of New Albany is to be maintained, then you will be able to sell automobiles for some years to come and we can keep our economy operating under the capitalistic system."

"I am sorry to have made the letter so long, but I was distressed at your apparently complete inability to understand the economic facts of life."

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 22 (U. P.).—Sixteen members of the Indianapolis, Ind., Chamber of Commerce good-will tour left here last night for Caracas, Venezuela, on the first leg of a 40-day-air tour of South America.

The group will study business and industry with a view of increasing trade relations with their city and the Pan American countries.

The group is led by Mrs. Lillian Kreps, manager of the chamber's trade relations committee.

## Confirm Death of Machinist's Mate

**THE DEATH** of Machinist's Mate 2-c Mack Dobkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Dobkins, 1444 Rembrandt st., was confirmed recently by the navy department.

Machinist Dobkins, who was 29, had been missing in action since Feb. 28, 1942, when his cruiser, the U. S. S. Houston, was sunk in the Java sea.

He was a former Technical high school student and worked for the Beverage Paper Co. before he enlisted in the navy in August, 1938.

Besides his parents, survivors are a twin sister, Mercedes of Indianapolis, and another sister, Mrs. Brooks Smith of Bluffton; twin brothers, Tom and John, both with the navy in the Atlantic, and another brother, Ensign Knute Dobkins, stationed on Guam.

**CZECH FASCISTS HANGED IN PRAGUE**  
PRAGUE, Jan. 21 (Delayed) (U. P.).—Gens. Robert Rychtmoc and Otto Blaha were hanged in the Pankrac prison courtyard today, three hours after they were convicted of treason for pro-Fascist activity during the war.

The double execution was carried out before official witnesses after the rejection of pleas for clemency. They were on trial for a week before a national court.

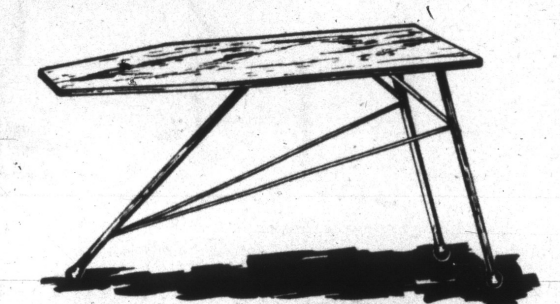

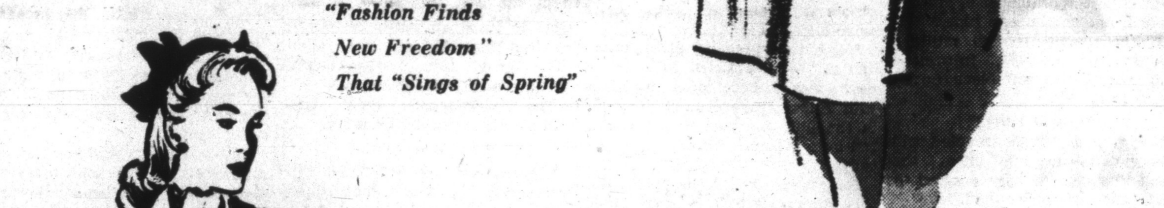
