Rites for Dr. I. D. Reynierson, Clernont, oldest practicing veterinarian in the state who died Saturday, will be conducted at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow in the Clernont Christian church by the Rev. Harry Davis. He was 82.

Dr. Reynierson had been a veterinarian 50 years. During the Boer war, he worked for the British government. He was an expert on foot and mouth disease and tuberculosis of cattle.

He had operated drugstores in Brownsburg and Clernont in addition to his practice. He was a 3rd degree Mason, and a member of the Scottish Rite and Murat Shrine.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Ethel Tansel Reynierson; a son, Walter Reynierson, Indianapolis, and a daughter, Mrs. Beatie Hughes, Lafayette.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. tomorrow in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary by the Rev. John P. Edwards, pastor of Broadway Methodist church. Burial at Greenwood will follow.
