Dr. I. D. Reynierison, State's Oldest Veterinarian, Dies

Rites for Dr. I. D. Reynierison, Clermont, oldest practicing veterinarian in the state who died Saturday, will be conducted at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow in the Clermont Christian church by the Rev. Harry Davis. He was 82.

Dr. Reynierison had been a veterinarian 50 years. During the Boer war, he worked for the British government. It was an expert on foot and mouth disease and tuberculosis of cattle.

He had operated drugstores in Brownsburg and Clermont in addition to his practice. He was a 33-degree Mason, and a member of the Scottish Rite and Murat Shrine.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Ethel Tansel Reynierison; a son, Walter Reynierison, Indianapolis, and a daughter, Mrs. Bessie Hughes, Lafayette.
