Executive Known for Gift Of Cancer Clinic.

Services for Edwin L. Patrick, Indianapolis businessman and donor who died Saturday in his home, 421 N. Pennsylvania st., will be held at 10 a. m. Wednesday in St. Peter and Paul Cathedral.

Burial will be in Crown Hill. President and manager of the C. B. Cones & Son Manufacturing Co., 18 N. Senate ave., Mr. Patrick was 77. He took a great interest in medicine during his lifetime and in 1939 presented the \$100,000 E. L. Patrick Cancer clinic to City hospital.

An Indianapolis resident for 39 years, Mr. Patrick resided in one of the few Indianapolis mansions still standing in the downtown area. His home recently was sold to the Indianapolis 40 & 8.

He was a member of St. Peter and Paul Cathedral and the Union Made Garment Manufacturers' association.

Surviving are two brothers, Albert H. Tallahassee, Fla., and Willis, Paris, Tex.; a sister, Mrs. Cora Young, Austin, Tex., and several nieces and nephews.

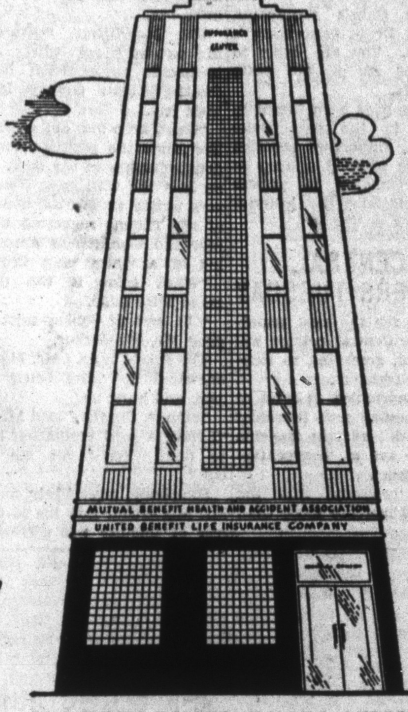
