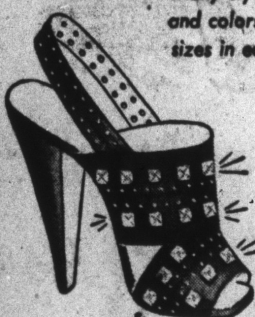

GATES AVOIDS RELIEF FIGHT

Advices Frisbie That Courts
Offer Only Recourse.

Governor Gates said today the courts offer the only recourse for settlement of labor leaders' complaint that Decatur township has refused poor relief to strikers.

The governor's statement was made in a reply to a letter written him yesterday by Walter Frisbie, secretary of the Indiana State Industrial Union council.

Mr. Frisbie asked the governor to investigate charges that Herbert H. Edwards, Decatur trustee, "not only refused assistance to these persons but attempted to force them to accept employment at sweat shop wages in his own private business."

"No Authority Over Trustee"

"In the event a township trustee is not properly performing his duties, recourse can be had to the courts in our state to compel him to do so," the governor wrote.

"There is no provision under our laws whereby the governor's office has any authority over a township trustee or the decisions made by him in relief matters," he concluded.

Mr. Frisbie expressed belief that "if people are in need they are entitled to assistance and the fact that they may be involved in a lock-out is irrelevant."

CABINET DESIGNER DIES HERE TODAY

Erwin T. Wagner, Indianapolis cabinet designer, died today at his home, 6612 Broadway.

Mr. Wagner was head designer and estimator of the Aetna Cabinet Co. for many years. He designed the cabinets for most of the banks and drug stores in Indianapolis.

The body was taken to the Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Cecile Wagner; his mother, Mrs. Dora Wagner, Owensboro, Ky.; a daughter, Mrs. Juanita Wheeler, Gainesville, Fla.; and a brother, C. F. Wagner, Detroit.

SAYS HITLER WAS INJURED IN BLAST

NUERNBERG, Feb. 1 (U. P.).—Adolf Hitler was mute and deaf for "several weeks" after the attempt to assassinate him on July 20, 1944, Marshal Wilhelm Keitel was revealed today to have told allied officers.

Keitel and Col. Gen. Alfred Jodl, both defendants in the war crimes trial, also were injured seriously enough to require corrective operations, according to information made available to the United Press.

"There was a blinding flash and resounding explosion," Keitel told allied officers. He was hurled backward by the blast which wrecked a temporary frame hut in which Hitler was holding a staff meeting, and Hitler was thrown into his arms.

Keitel said Hitler's arm was injured, his hearing and power of speech destroyed temporarily. Some five months later Hitler underwent an operation by the same surgeon who operated on Keitel and Jodl, and the fuhrer's hearing was restored.

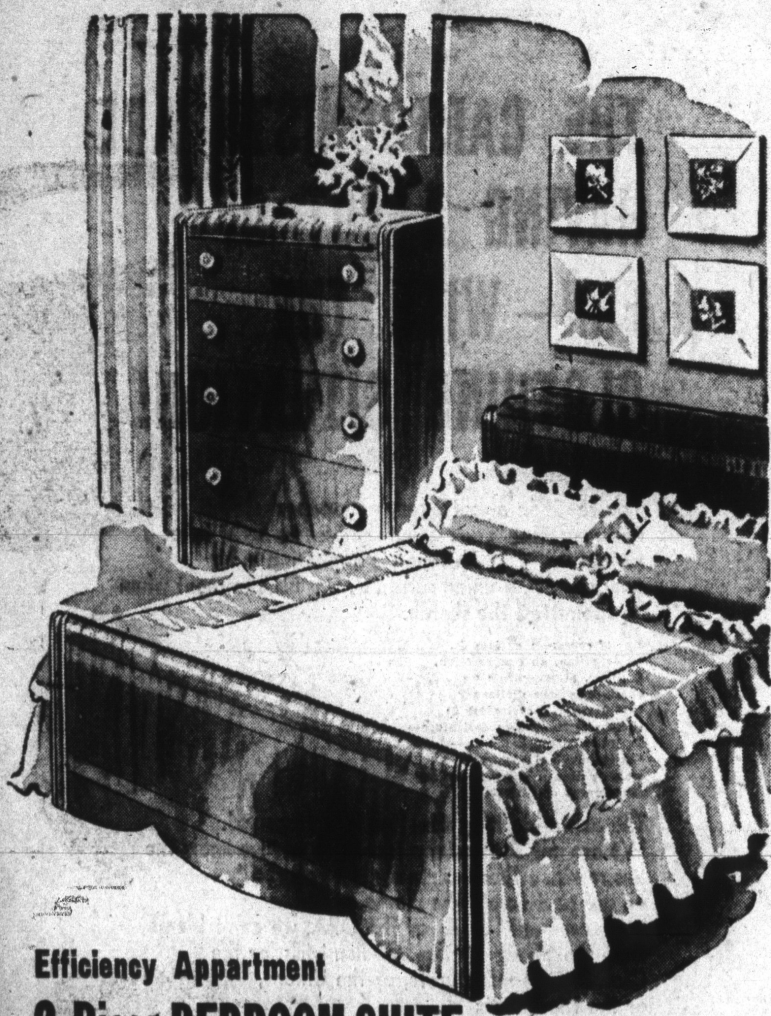
