

EXPECT RECORD CROWD AT SHOW

Garden Groups Say Exhibits Will Be Post-War Types.

Interest in post-war housing, landscaping and new home appliances should establish new attendance records for the Indianapolis Home Show to open May 9 in the Manufacturers building at the state fairground, according to J. Frank Cantwell, director.

Mr. Cantwell, meeting with local garden club representatives yesterday to discuss ticket sales promotions, said he recently visited the opening of a similar show in Cleveland where 80,000 persons attended the first two days. The last show here in 1941 attracted 100,000 people.

The model home to be exhibited this year is being planned by three local architects. Mr. Cantwell said the home will be typical of housing that will comply with building restriction directives.

An innovation at this year's show will be shadow boxes of flowers to replace gardens that could not be prepared because home show producers did not obtain the manufacturers building until March 15 when the army air forces vacated.

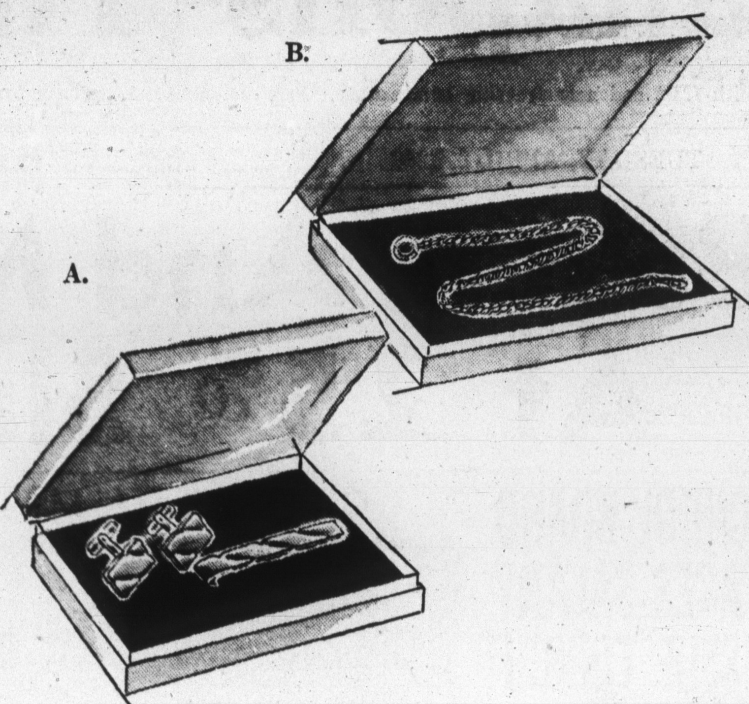
BLIND STUDENTS PLAN OPERETTA

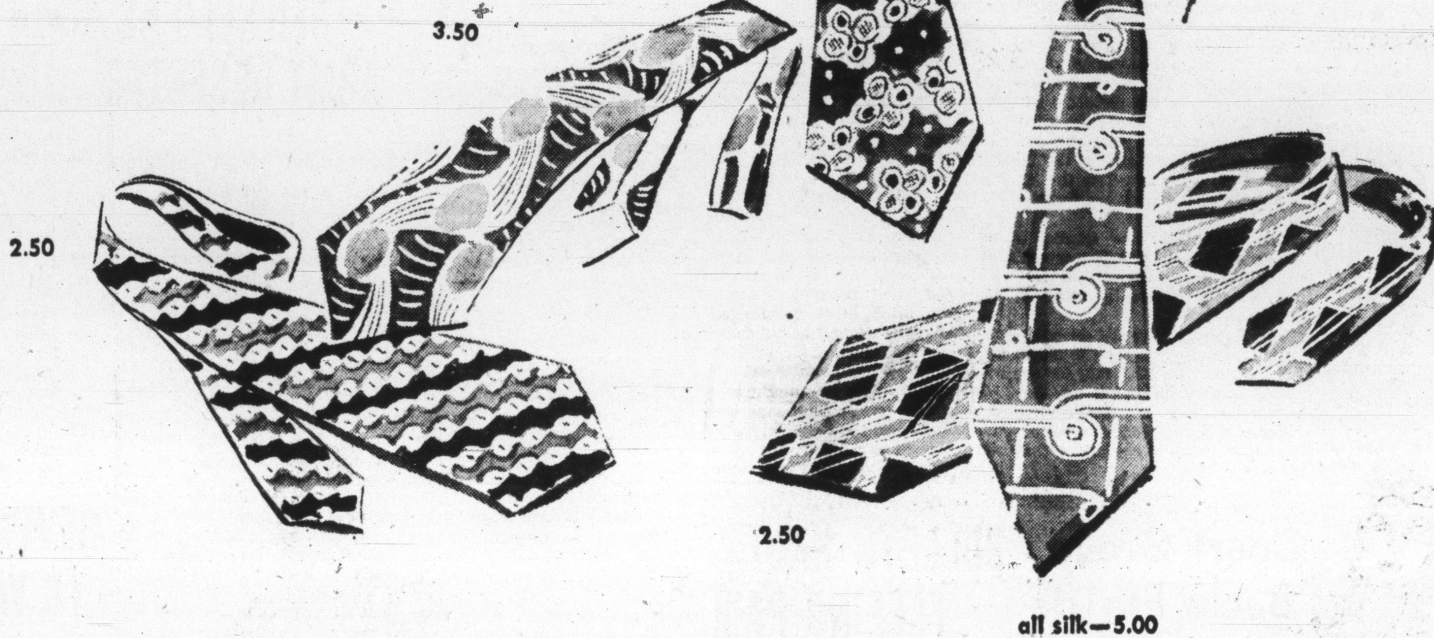

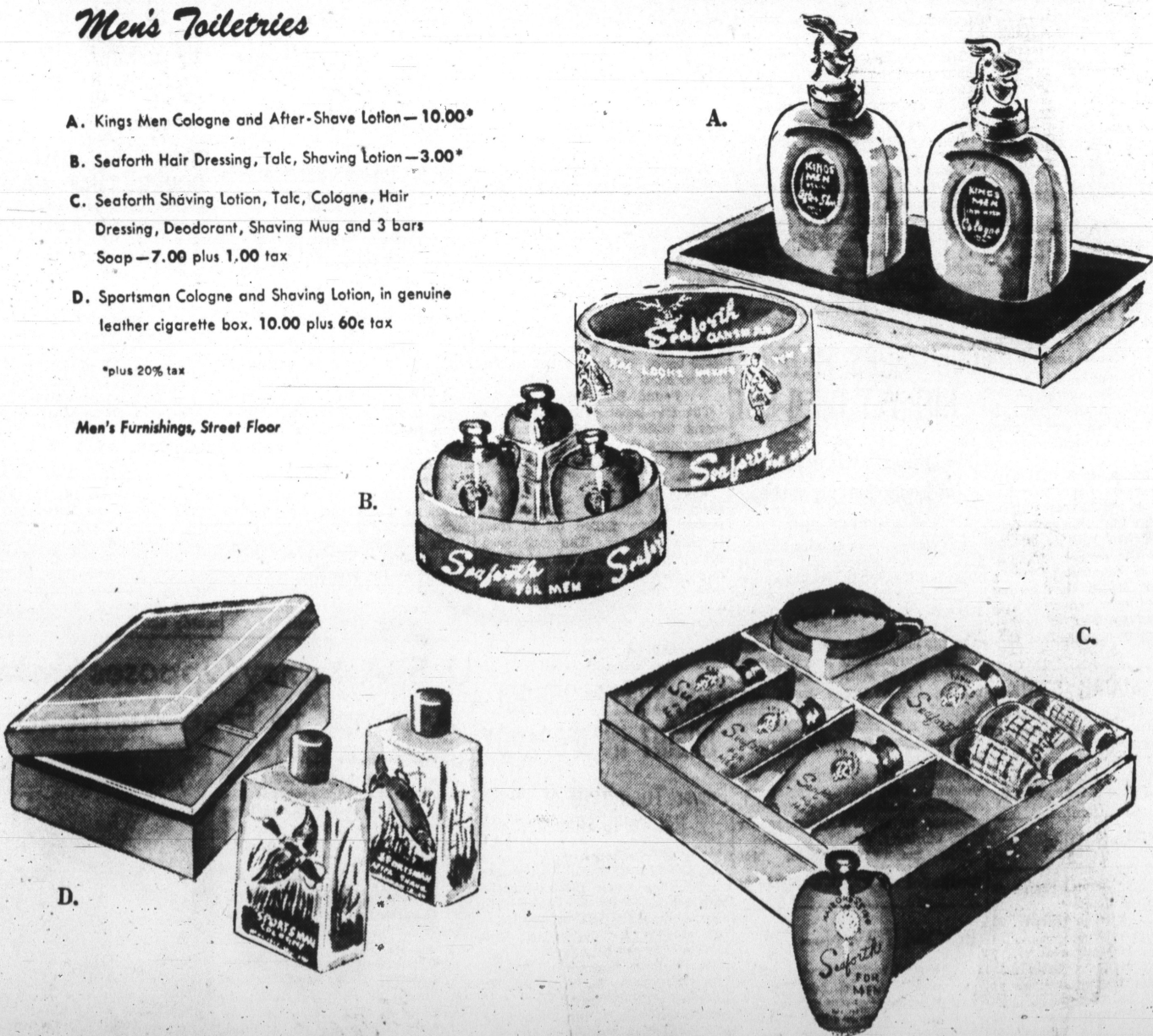
