The state association of automobile dealers today supported the OPA's apprehension of used car black market bootleggers who "are not the average established car dealer."

Herman Schaefer, executive secretary for the state group said he will "but better, bread or meat that close scrutiny of those implicated will prove them to be not the regularly established merchant but those who saw an opportunity to make a lot of quick money and then get out."

Automobile bootleggers, he said, are doing 10 to 15 per cent of the price ceiling violations, but at least 75 per cent or more of the total sales violations in used car sales, are being made by individuals.

## Missing Airmen Reported Dead

Parents Officially Informed Flier Sons Killed in Action

Families of two Indianapolis airmen who have been listed missing in action have been informed the men have been reported dead.

The casualties are S. Sgt. Harold L. Burk, 31, husband of Mrs. Kathleen M. Burk, 2525 Shelby st., and Lt. James B. Sample, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Palmer C. Sample, R. 20, Box 477-A.

Aerial engineer on a B-24, Sgt. Burk was killed March 24, 1945, over Luzon. He was on a mission from Clark field, Manila, to Takao, Formosa.

Lost on 21st Mission

On his 21st mission at the time he was lost, Sgt. Burk held the air medal, citation of honor and the purple heart, the latter awarded posthumously. A lifelong resident of Southport, he is survived by his widow; two brothers, Orville A. Burk, Palm Harbor, Fla., and Russell C. Burk, Southport, and a sister, Mrs. Helen Morris, Indianapolis.

Lt. Sample, a B-24 pilot, was killed when his plane was shot down over Schouwen Island, Holland, April 5, 1945. His parents have been informed their son and other members of the crew were buried in a mass grave at Haansteede, Holland.

Thanked by Hollanders

Hollanders, who wrote Mr. Sample that they "were greatly appreciative of what the Americans did" held a memorial service on the anniversary of the crew's death and have planted flowers on the grave.

A veteran of nine missions, Lt. Sample held the air medal with oak leaf cluster, the presidential citation and the purple heart. He was a graduate of Decatur Central high school, member of Camby Community church and a former employee of the Griffin Engineering Co.

Surviving are his parents; a sister, Mrs. Joan Dallery, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George E. Castle, all of Indianapolis.
