VISUAL INSTITUTE OPENS AT PURDUE

The state association of automobile dealers today supported the OPA's apprehension of used car black market bootleggers who are not the average established car dealer.

Herman Schaefer, executive secretary for the state group said he will be butter, bread or meat that close scrutiny of those implicated will prove them to be not the regularly established merchant but those who saw an opportunity to make a lot of quick money and then get out."

Automobile bootleggers, he said, are doing 10 to 15 per cent of the price ceiling violations, but at least 75 per cent or more of the total sales violations in used car sales are being made by individuals.
