VETERANS BUREAU REMOVAL STARTED

Filing cabinets and heavy fixtures were being removed today from the Indianapolis veterans administration fairgrounds office in preparation for official opening of the Century building headquarters Aug. 1.

Units which will vacate the fairgrounds site Aug. 15 are finance, personnel, adjudication, supply and communications.

The fairgrounds components numbering 553 employees will be the vanguard of a staff of 1200 to occupy the first four floors of the recently acquired office building. The bulk of the personnel is housed at the Old Trails building and the Veterans' hospital on Cold Spring road. Moving will not be completed for several months, officials said.

Teacher Training Scholarships Awarded

Eleven top-ranking Hoosier high school graduates, including three from Marion county, have been awarded teacher training scholarships by the Indiana State Teachers association.

Sue Rosa Fisher, a valedictorian of Technical high school's 850 seniors, received a \$2000 scholarship. Jane Ellen Lindenberg of Shortridge high school and Anna Marie Thompson of Speedway City high school were awarded \$400 scholarships.

Also receiving a \$2000 scholarship was Donita Stobaugh, valedictorian of Cambridge City high school. The \$2000 awards were made available to the State Teachers association by the Tee Pee restaurant, 38th st. and Fall Creek blvd., and the Indiana Congress of Parents and Teachers association.

Competition for a third \$2000

grant ended in a three-way tie. As a result, the association gave a \$1000 scholarship to the three deadlocked contestants—Jacqueline Sterner, valedictorian at South Side high school, Ft. Wayne; Frances Shipley, valedictorian at Merrillville high school and Virginia Ruth Combs, salutatorian, Garfield high school, Terre Haute.

Other \$400 scholarships were given to Marjorie Ellen Graber, Bloomington; Ruby Ellen Herron, Waynesburg; Patricia Ellen Mason, Swayze, and Patricia Lee Tomlin, Terre Haute.

A total of 178 graduates competed, among them 50 who rated first or second scholastic places in their respective classes. Participation was limited to graduates ranking in the upper third of their classes.

Selection of winners by the scholarship committee of the state teachers association was on the basis of transcripts of high school credits, recommendations of high school authorities, results of standardized tests, achievements in grammar, literature and mathematics. Other factors taken under consideration were personality, character, community and school activities and "evidence of interest and aptitude for teaching."

Awards were made by Robert H. Wyatt, executive secretary of the association.

PURDUE PROFESSOR TO RETIRE SEPT. 1

LAFAYETTE, July 24.—Dean A. A. Potter of Purdue schools of engineering announced today the retirement of Charles A. Ellis, professor of structural engineering at the university for 12 years.

Prof. Ellis will be replaced Sept. 1 by Prof. Lawrence T. Wyly, who has been associate professor of structural engineering at Northwestern Technological Institute of Northwestern university.

A designing engineer on the Golden Gate bridge, Prof. Ellis received his bachelor's degree from Wesleyan university, Middletown, Conn., in 1900, and the C. E. degree from University of Illinois in 1922.

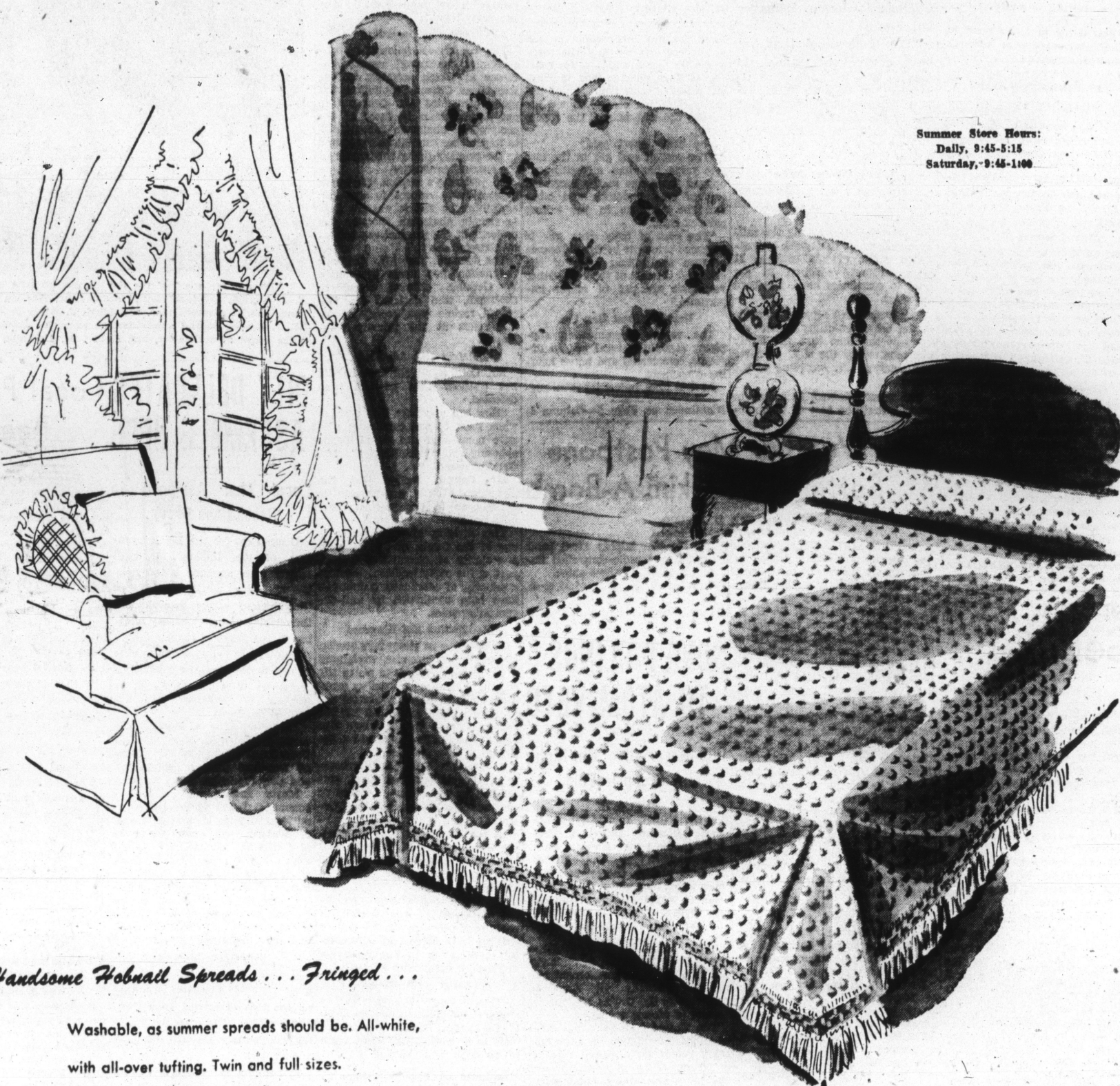

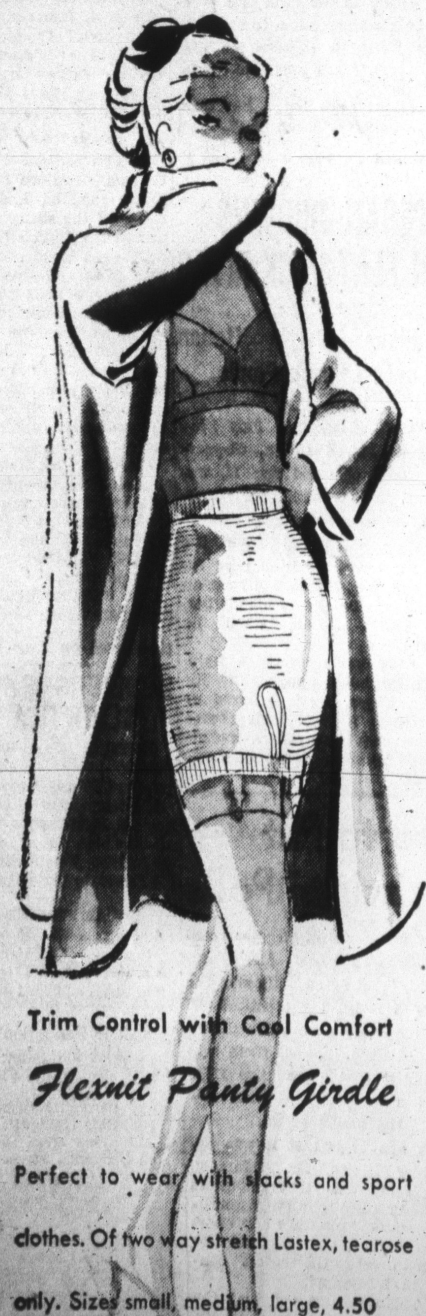
