

Name Gates, Others In CIO Troop Ban Suit

UNION CHARGES UNLAWFUL USE OF GUARDSMEN

Veterans at Connersville Defy Picket Lines to Continue Work.

Governor Gates and other state officials today faced suit in federal court for their action in calling out state guardsmen to cover the opening of a strikebound plant in Connersville.

The complaint, filed yesterday by attorneys for the C. I. O. United Electrical Workers union, charged the governor had acted illegally in calling out the guard. He mobilized state troops and state police to uphold a Fayette circuit court injunction against mass picketing at the Rex Manufacturing Co. plant.

From Connersville, meanwhile, came a report that more than 280 veterans crossed the picket lines at the Rex plants, standing pat on the contention they are not strike breakers.

Protest Label of 'Scab'

In a paid advertisement yesterday in a Connersville newspaper, the group protested against being called "scabs" by "wildcat pickets." They pointed out they were exercising peacefully their "lawful right to work," despite the fact the plants still were being picketed by C. I. O. electrical workers.

Union leaders asked the federal court to enjoin the state heads from using the guard in future cases of "peaceful picketing." Twelve C. I. O. pickets were arrested last Saturday on riot charges and when the guardsmen and state police took over Monday, 30 more were jailed for mass picketing in violation of the court order.

Others named as defendants in the suit were Adj. Gen. Ben Watt, State Police Superintendent Austin William, Fayette county Sheriff Reed Fiedling, and President Edgar Meyer of the Rex company.

Charge Intimidation

Charging constitutional rights of the C. I. O. union members had been violated, the injunction suit charged pickets and onlookers had been intimidated by "menace of arms." It charged state police officers were armed with "pistols, tear gas and clubs" and alleged the union would "continue to suffer" unless the governor be enjoined "from commission of unlawful acts."

Union attorneys also were scheduled to file an appeal with the national labor relations board for reinstatement and back pay for an estimated 50 former employees of the company.

Cites Board Policy

A spokesman for the NLRB pointed out, however, that the board policy currently is to regard the company's contract with the A. F. of L. union as a bar to the election sought by the C. I. O.

The board requires, he said, that where a union serves notice that it regards itself as representing a majority of employees and this notice is filed just before a contract is signed with another union, the dissenting union has only 10 days within which to ask for bargaining election.

Since the C. I. O. workers in the Rex case failed to petition for an election within the required 10 days and since the company meantime signed its A. F. of L. contract, the spokesman said. He indicated a new petition for election probably could not be considered for a year.

Father Divine, Blond Bride Eat Pork Chops in Newark

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 9 (U. P.).—Father Divine, the cult leader who claims he is "god," was on a tour of the "heavens" today with his 21-year-old blond bride.

The pudgy, 71-year-old self-styled "messiah" brought his bride, the former Edna Ritchings of Vancouver, B. C., to his "heaven annex" in Newark last night and ate a very earthly supper of pork chops, lamb chops and fried chicken with 1000 of his disciples.

Watermelon was passed out the back door of "heaven" to the 500 cult members who could not get through the gates.

The visit caused great excitement in Harlem "heaven" where it was hoped Father Divine would bring his bride Sunday.

Horn Blares Arrival

Hundreds of his followers waited patiently outside the Newark "heaven," a converted Turkish bath, all afternoon for a glimpse of the "Messiah" and the girl he married in Washington last April 29.

A large sedan, its horn blaring, heralded his arrival and the crowd began chanting "Peace, Father, Peace, It's Wonderful."

When the party, which included the honeymoon couple and the bridegroom's attractive, red-haired secretary, left the car, the crowd surged forward to touch Father Divine and to get a look at his bride.

Spirit "Reincarnated"

After the supper, Father Divine and his bride, who now is known as "Sweet Angel," gave a press interview in an upstairs room where

USE OF PLANES HIT BY LIBERTIES UNION

The American Civil Liberties union today protested to Governor Gates against use of state guard airplanes as a police method in handling strike crises.

"It has been called to our attention," a union letter from New York said, "that in connection with the strike at the Rex Manufacturing Co. in Connersville, Ind., the state guard had recourse to the use of airplanes. Accounts reaching us indicate they were used in such a manner as to intimidate the striking employees."

"If these reports are true, we most seriously protest such an obvious misuse of police power."

C. I. O. spokesmen also have protested what they termed "terroristic" use of three reconnaissance planes which they charge "buzzed" spectators and pickets Monday.

NAVY COOK ADMITS SLAYING OF SEAMAN

KEY WEST, Fla., Aug. 9 (U. P.).—David Joseph Watson, 22, navy cook, last night confessed the bludgeon-strangle slaying of Seaman Leroy Hobbs, of Nebo, N. C., aboard the U. S. destroyer Stribling.

Hobbs' battered and strangled body, clad only in a pair of shorts, was found in a gun turret aboard the ship on July 25.

66 KNOWN DEAD IN UPHEAVALS

Indies Quiet After Series of Quakes, Waves.

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic, Aug. 9 (U. P.).—The series of earthquakes which has shaken the West Indies and whipped up two tidal waves in five days subsided today.

Thousands of frightened evacuees hoped they might soon return home.

Much additional damage was reported from the tidal wave that hit the already battered town of Matanzas, on the north shore of the Dominican Republic, yesterday. There were no reports of additional deaths.

At least 66 have been killed in the earth and sea upheavals since Sunday.

Two severe earth tremors shook the Dominican Republic, Haiti and Puerto Rico yesterday. There was panic here and in other cities of the affected area, but it was dying away today.

A wireless dispatch from United Press Correspondent Milton Carr, aboard the U. S. S. San Carlos off Matanzas, gave an eyewitness account of the tidal wave that swept over the town yesterday morning.

Inundated 2d Time

The wave, which followed an earth tremor, was the second to inundate Matanzas.

Mr. Carr reported the sea receded 400 yards from the shore at Matanzas at 10 a. m. Two minutes later it rushed back and burst over the town. All the fleeing inhabitants were believed to have reached high ground safely.

Five severe shocks within 30 minutes shook the ship, Mr. Carr reported.

Fordham Records Two More Temblors

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (U. P.).—Two more temblors in the series which has caused loss of life and heavy property damage in the Caribbean have been recorded on the Fordham university seismograph, the Rev. Fr. Joseph Lynch, seismologist, reported today.

Both temblors, which occurred yesterday, were described as of "mild intensity."

RACE TRACK WINNER COLLAPSES AND DIES
