

2 Killed By Cars in 4 Crown In Low State Holiday Toll

3 Indianapolis Residents Perish as Boat Capsizes; Minister's Son Is Hurt

Indiana's holiday death toll so far is surprisingly low. Only two persons died in traffic accidents in the state, a city-to-city check by Times' correspondents, United Press and Indiana state police disclosed.

There was no traffic fatalities in Marion county, but there are 24 hours to go.

Four persons died by drowning. Three were Indianapolis residents.

Two Traffic Victims
Leeman Robinson, 20, of Grovetown, died in a traffic collision near Hamilton and Miss Alice Joyce Lloyd, 23, Muncie, was injured fatally in a jeep-car collision in Muncie.

Francis D. Lowe, 24, son of the Rev. Ephraim D. Lowe, general secretary of the Christian Missionary association, is in critical condition at Methodist hospital with injuries received in a two-car crash Saturday at Kessler blvd. and State road 37.

Mr. Lowe's car was hit by an auto driven by Robert E. Skinner, 20, of 5835 Kingsley dr., who was charged with failure to stop for a preferential highway.

Two Boys Injured
Two boys, Ronald Jackson, 13, of 21 S. Colorado st. and Donald Johnson, 11, of 51 S. Colorado st., were injured Saturday when they fell from a ice-truck at Linwood and Washington sts. Ronald received head injuries and is in serious condition at City hospital.

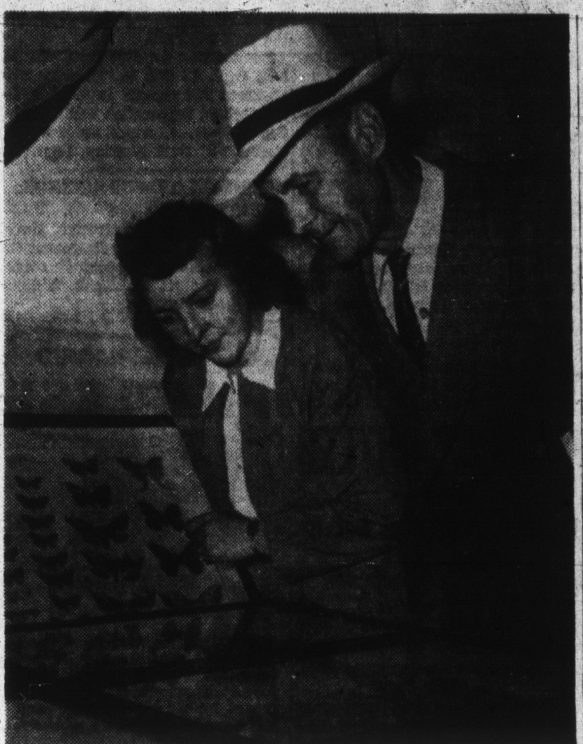

FAIR NEWSPAPER IS BEING ISSUED

I. U. Students Carry On In Pyle Tradition.

A staff of picked students from the campus at Bloomington annually publishes a state fair edition, beginning with the first issue editor by the late Ernie Pyle.

First-place in the best educational display of vegetable-growing organizations was won by the Terre Haute Vegetable Growers' association. The DeKalb county association was second and Marion county, third.

Best exhibit of county agricultural associations was won by the Rush county farm bureau. Marion county 4-H boys' leaders' organization was second.

Marion county home exhibit was first in a home economic exhibit, second-place going to the Vigo county exhibit group. Third-place was won by the Marion county 4-H girls' leaders' organization.

A feature of the educational exhibit in the agriculture and horticulture bldg. is a test for housewives to determine how much they know about meat cuts.

Numbered consecutively, 25 retail cuts of beef, pork, lamb and veal are displayed. Visitors are invited to match numbers of the cuts with names printed on a contest entry form.

"We had no idea how popular the idea would prove," declared M. O. Cullen, director, department of meat merchandising, National Livestock and Meat board, who introduced the exhibit.

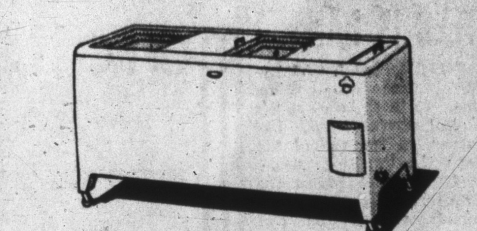
